

Fred Magee is Appointed A Member of the Government But Without a Portfolio

Final Party Conventions Are Being Held—The Independent Ticket in Northumberland County—Hon. C. H. LaBilios Running in Restigouche County

Fred Magee, who represented Westmorland in the last Legislature and was chief Liberal whip in the House, has been appointed a member of the Provincial Government without portfolio, according to announcement made today by Premier Foster. He was sworn in this morning at St. John.

Mr. Magee presumably takes the place vacated by the appointment of Hon. C. W. Robinson as Minister of Lands and Mines, the portfolio formerly held in Westmorland. Mr. Robinson is to be sworn in this afternoon. The elevation of Mr. Magee does not improve the rather unsatisfactory apportionment of portfolios and cabinet positions which has existed and caused so much difficulty for the Foster Government.

Final Conventions Today.
The final party conventions for nomination of candidates are taking place today and tomorrow will be held in the afternoon at St. John. The Independent ticket in Northumberland County are meeting in a combined convention this afternoon and it is expected will agree upon a ticket consisting of Charles J. Morrisey, ex-Mayor of Newcastle, Fred Fowle, of Little Branch, one of the candidates named by the United Farmers, John S. Martin, of Chatham, and J. W. Vanderbeck, of Millerton, the last two named having been nominated by the Labor party.

In Restigouche County, Hon. C. H. LaBilios, of Dalhousie, told The Gleaner over the long distance telephone today that he and William W. Dunlop, of Campbellton, are in the field in Restigouche County as a Liberal ticket in support of the Foster Government and will be nominated as such tomorrow. "While Mr. LaBilios and his colleagues claim they are the ticket of the Government convention, it was a packed convention," said Mr. LaBilios. "We are the people's candidates and, after having been all over the county, I do not hesitate to say that we have splendid prospects of success." Mr. LaBilios said that Mr. LeBlanc and his colleagues were also still in the field, as well as the opposition ticket.

3.86 Inches of Rain

In Week's Downpour

Almost two and a half inches of rain have fallen here in the twenty-four hours ending at noon today, bringing the total rainfall for the present week up to 3.86 inches, according to statistics given out at the Dominion Meteorological Station here today. It is believed that the statistics for September, when completed, will show the rainfall last month to have been far above the average. This week's rain has retarded work of the farms and will, it is believed, still further reduce the yield of potatoes in New Brunswick.

farm, which he is to take possession of on November 1st and then commence immediate operation.

While engaged as representative of the Department of Agriculture at Morrisburg, Ont., Mr. Bradt was secured for the position of deputy minister here and came to Fredericton in January, 1919. His home is at Kaysville, Ont., and he is a graduate of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph with the degree of B. S. A.

Mr. Bradt said this morning that the fruit farm which he has secured is well planted on and all the trees are in their prime. It contains over one thousand five hundred peach trees, four acres of grapes, several acres of pears, plums and cherries, and a considerable acreage of small fruits such as strawberries, raspberries, currants and gooseberries. It is considered one of the best fruit farms in the district and is situated close to shipping facilities both by Hydro-Rail and lake navigation. The business is taken over as a going concern and includes a full equipment of modern implements for fruit growing on a large scale.

I recognize the right of any elector, or any body of electors, to require from a candidate seeking their suffrage a definite declaration of his position upon any matter of public importance. I cannot concur, however, in the principle that any person or any association, even though actuated by the most worthy motives, should require from any candidate a signed pledge covering such statement of his position.

was formerly Miss Bridges, of Sherfield; two sons, Parker and Glen; four brothers, Fred, of Worcester, Mass.; Marshall, William and Truman, of this city; and one sister, Mrs. Harry Edson, of Maine.

Further and to demand a signed pledge, in my judgment, an imputation against his honor and good faith. I do not suggest that the respondent, in this case, was so intended, and I am quite ready to acknowledge the sincerity of purpose of the members of the Alliance, and the difficulty they have met and are bound to meet in carrying out this purpose. This fact, however, does not effect the principle I have stated, or my view with respect thereto.

This is, I believe, the principle that should apply in all cases, no matter what the subject matter. Let me say that the view I have stated is my own individual view, expressed without any direction, influence or suggestion of, or from, any person, body or party.

Having stated my position with respect to the general principle, I desire to state publicly my position with respect to the specific matters mentioned in these questions. My sympathies have been, and are today, with Prohibition. I would support resolutions asking for a referendum.

So far as amendments to the act are concerned they must be considered and judged upon their merits as they arise. This is my position with respect to this matter. It is, I believe, sufficiently clear and explicit.

As I have intimated above, the course I have taken is the result of my personal conviction, uninfluenced by any person or party. To me it seems the proper course, irrespective of its effect or influence upon the electorate. To the electors I desire to say this: You know something of my personal record, you have the public statement of my position; you will have to form your own conclusion as to my sincerity and my conduct.

Sir George E. Foster Here For Anniversary Services At George Street Church

Minister of Trade and Commerce Was Superintendent of Sunday School While Professor at U. N. B.—Progress of the Baptists in the Maritime Provinces

Sir George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, who, while professor of classics at the University of New Brunswick here in the '70s was superintendent of the Sunday school at the church, arrived here this morning from Ottawa and will be the principal speaker at the closing service of the 75th anniversary celebration at the George Street Baptist church this evening.

Just a few minutes before the opening of the service last night the lights went out in the church and for a little while it looked as if the service would have to be given up, but lamps were secured and in what was very much like the "candle light" of seventy-five years ago the entire service was held. It was a forcible reminder of the wonderful advance which has been made in the lighting of public buildings since the George street church was organized.

There was a good attendance in spite of the rain, and splendid addresses were given by Rev. Waldo C. Macdonald, field secretary of the Maritime Baptist Sunday School Board and Young People's Societies, one of the large number of young men who have gone out from the George street church into the ministry. He is making a great success of his work, and the George street people feel justly proud of him. His sister, Miss Grace Macdonald, is the representative of the George street church out in India. Mr. Macdonald expressed his pleasure at being able to be present at the 75th anniversary in the old George street church, his home church.

It was denominational night, and the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces, he said, had a great opportunity. The great Forward Movement was launched under the impulse of the spirit of God. Maritime Baptists five years ago set before themselves a five year programme. Some thought it impossible of attainment, but the goal has not only been reached but over-reached. The task was to reach \$100,000 this year, and it looks now as if \$120,000 would be received.

Rev. M. Addison, the predecessor of the present pastor, Rev. Z. L. Fash, gave a fine address on "Evangelism and our Home Missionary Enterprise." He was very glad to be back in the George street church. The Baptists of America, he said, have magnified the name of Jesus, and have prospered more than any other religious body, outnumbering every other religious body in the United States and commanding one-fifth of the entire population.

The fathers of the Baptist body in the Maritime Provinces magnified the importance of true evangelism and like flaming torches, went through this country, and so the Baptists of the Maritime Provinces outnumber all other denominations. In the province of New Brunswick they are two to one to every other Protestant body. Evangelism has made us what we are, and Mr. Addison, "Out of these little home mission churches have come some of the leading men in Canada like Sir George E. Foster, Dr. E. M. Kierstead, of MacMaster University, Toronto, Rev. E. W. Kelly, of Burnham, and Rev. H. B. Ganong, the honored home mission superintendent of the Baptists of New Brunswick. Our future policy is to stimulate evangelism in our churches and in our educational institutions."

While in Fredericton, Sir George

Foster is the guest of Dr. and Mrs. G. C. VanWart and is being warmly welcomed by many old friends. He goes from here to St. John for the laying of the cornerstone of the new Victoria street Baptist church tomorrow afternoon.
