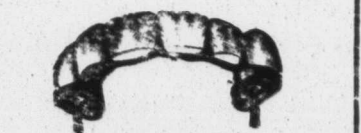

CURE SICK HEADACHE.
MISS LUCY DOGGETT.

Food Chemist of the Illinois State
Food Commission.

In Chicago there is a pretty young
woman who by pluck and spunk has
won the proud title of the only fem-
inine food chemist in the world.
Her name is Lucy Doggett, and she
has come to be the principal reliance
of the Illinois state food commission.
Miss Doggett is slender and youth-
ful, with a girlish trick of blushing at
slightest complimentary mention of her
distinctive abilities and attainments.
"Food chemistry" the pretty pioneer
regards as opening the gate of a new,
attractive and ever widening field of
feminine effort. Her own triumphant
entry into this field came about through
a combination of wise forethought,
careful preparation and happy chance.
A little more than five years ago
Miss Doggett, whose home is in Mc-
Kinney, Tex., concluded her high school

course and carefully scanned the men-
tal horizon for a suitable profession.

a dispensing chemist as the best fitted

ally acknowledged violation of
the law could not long remain
unchecked and fully punished if
be the inspector or police perform-
of their duty.

Towards the end of February,
1905, the town was withdrawn
from the jurisdiction of County
Inspector Menzies on the appoint-
ment of a day policeman, to whom
with the night policeman, was
entrusted the duty of seeing that
the act was enforced, with results
which may be gleaned from Mr.
Menzies' report. He reports to
the county council, in part as
follows: "I find more difficulty
has in former years to unearth
the places where it is sold
lawfully, owing to the free and
easy way in which the act is en-
forced in the towns of Newcastle
and Chatham. It was difficult
enough when I had only the
inspections from adjoining coun-
ties to contend with, but with two
towns over which I have no con-
trol, situated in the very heart of
the county, it becomes very easy
for parties or witnesses who may
be so disposed to say they got
their liquor in Newcastle, or they
got it in Chatham, when seen or
known to be under the influence
of liquor, or have it in their pos-
session in or about suspicious
places, which makes it almost
impossible to commence a prosecution.

In his report to the town council
after having referred to the
appointment of a policeman to act
also as inspector, and having
stated that in the beginning of
1905 he gave the same attention to
his duties as in former years, he
concluded: "However, in June I
found that the violations within
the town were so frequent that it
made it very disagreeable in the
outlying parishes over which I was
inspector, and finding that one
place in the town was dealing in
the illegal traffic, and not being
satisfied that the people
were being supplied by him—
mostly country people from the
parishes of North Esk, and South
Esk—I determined to enter a
prosecution against him myself,
which I did; and it resulted in the
conviction of W. H. McLean, on
the 20th of June. During the
pending of the case I learned that
much opposition was being made
in town to my prosecuting and
was informed that some of the
oldermen endeavored to have Mr.
McLean fight the case, on the
ground that I had not right to
bring prosecutions for violations
in the town. The council employ-
ed by the town also informed me
that a member of the police com-
mittee had notified him that his
fee for prosecution for me would
be opposed."

INVOLVES ALDERMEN.

In the case alluded to by Mr.
Menzies, the prosecutor received
his fees. It was after for the coun-
cil to do so in the light of facts.
The town inspector, the policeman,
said informant of Scott act vi-
olation against McLean and three
others some time before Menzies
took up the case; they were drop-
ped on the representations of two
aldermen to the inspector. Again,
some time after the police was
made Scott act inspectors, one of
them received instructions from all
aldermen save two that whilst
he might prosecute for first offences
he was not to lay information for
third offences. The present head
of the police committee also gave
such instructions. Hence there
was no one sent to jail from the
town, but fines were imposed, and
his was not often. The police-
man was to go slowly and with
incretion, even in matters of first
offences according to his instruc-
tions. There are countries in
which if aldermen interfered with
the observance of the laws, they
would soon find themselves in the
entailment.

The other policeman did not
give any information with the
prosecutor; besides being perma-
nent night policeman he was also
a Scott act inspector by re-
tention of council; and his time
or duty covered that period when
the greater number of violations of
the act took place. The special
policeman received a month's
notice last October. In an issue of
the Advocate two weeks ago we
said that the chairman of the town coun-
cil was asking its permission to

and the board of health of his
former instructions to the inspec-
tor to require a competent man
to enforce the law with a view of
stopping this nefarious traffic and
punishing offenders, if they will
not cease. This speaks for itself.

FINDS PROHIBITION

hands must lead us to the conclu-
sion that in practice an application
of the principle will lead to disas-
trous conditions although in the
region of the ideal and intellectual
total abstinence would be the most
perfect practice. For its realiza-
tion we must sorrowfully await the
millennium.

This morning's issue of the
Advocate is before me. I cannot
share the hopefulness of the
writer of the article. He should
have remembered the fate,
in the last and preceding
town elections, of two of
the most influential and respect-
able gentlemen at the hands of the
majority. Past experience furnish-
es little foundation for present
hope.
