The Manitoba Crop Bulletin for August contains the following:—1,488,322 acres of wheat yielded 25,913,000 bushels, being 17 1/2 bushels to the acre; oats yield, 18,029,944 bushels, average per acre 25.02; Barley total yield 4,611,314 bushels, average per acre 25.02.

Sir Louis Davies and Sir Richard Cartwright were interviewed in Quebec on the 24th by Messrs. M. McPherson and Andrew A. Day, representatives of the Allan and Dominion Steamship lines concerning next winter's mail service, the Beaver line contract being at most at an end.

About noon on the 24th inst., at Syracuse, N. Y., thousands of dollars worth of damage was done by hurricanes which swept the roof of four factories and part of that of the Church of the Assumption.

It is said that Chevalier Drolet, who was one of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's ambassadors to Rome, and who afterwards received gold dredging licenses without competition in the Northwest on terms that no one else could get, has sold his privileges to an English syndicate for \$200,000.—St. John Sun.

BURNING warships are being put in readiness to attack China should she fail to submit to England's wishes. Friendly relations are now thought to exist between the latter and Russia. All warships under 5,000 tons are being reviewed in the Yangtze River. Meetings for treaty purposes have been held frequently during the last few days.

THE cheese factory at Winlaw was burned to the ground last Monday night. The fire occurred at midnight and the cause of the fire is not known. The factory occupied a site of about 274 boxes of cheese were manufactured, and of these 104 have been saved. The building, plant, and stock were protected by insurance in the office of Mr. Horace Hazard.

MR. FRANCIS NORMANDE, a well-known resident of St. George, who died last week at the age of eighty years, has left an unusually large number of descendants. He was married in 1841, and had twenty-three children, fifteen of whom are still living. His grandchildren numbered a hundred and twenty, and seventy-two are still alive. He leaves thirteen great-grandchildren.—Montreal Witness.
