

AROUND THE CITY

(From Thursday's Daily.) T. S. F. Jackson has resigned the management of the branch of the Traders Bank in Edmonton. He is succeeded by H. C. Anderson, late of Sturgeon Falls, Ont., who assumed charge on Monday last.

The four street cars already in the city are now all ready for use. This afternoon No. 3 was run out for the first time and yesterday afternoon No. 4 was put into regular operation on the Alberta avenue-Twenty-first street route.

Four convictions of selling liquor without a license have been secured before C. H. West, J.P., of Lethbridge. The penalty in each case was a fine of \$50 and costs. Information was laid by Robt. Minions, of the license branch of the attorney general's department, located at Lethbridge.

BANK CLEARINGS. Edmonton bank clearings for the week ending today totaled \$974,434. For the corresponding week last year the total was \$971,830.62, and for the corresponding week in 1907 \$819,617.15. It will thus be seen that the clearings for the past week are larger than those for the similar week in 1907 or 1906.

STREETS IN DARKNESS. The streets of the city were in complete darkness last night owing to an accident to one of the poles carrying both the feed lines for the street cars and the street railway system. The trouble was caused by a pole arm breaking at the corner of Jasper ave. and Fourth street, which caused further down Fourth street near the corner of Saskatchewan avenue. As a result it was found necessary to shut off the street lights. The damage might have been repaired last evening, but owing to the unexpected downpour of rain it was found to be very dangerous to handle the wires especially when the full current is in use by the street cars.

ST. ANDREW'S SOCIETY. The annual meeting of the St. Andrew Society held last night in the City Council chamber was largely attended by some of the city's leading residents. The chair was occupied by the president, George J. Kinnaird, who made a speech referring to the work of the past year and the prospect for the future. The motion picture showing the work of the society was presented. A. C. Fraser, vice-president, and J. Mackay, secretary, also made speeches. The program of the evening included a recitation by Mrs. T. Todd, a play by Mrs. G. A. Ross, and a play by Mrs. G. A. Ross. The evening closed with a prayer by Rev. J. McKinnon.

TO GO TO A REFORMATORY. The young lad, George Mathews, who was a few weeks ago released from Fort Saskatchewan barracks, where he has served a sentence for the theft of chickens and has been released of the theft of \$6 from a Chinese restaurant, will be put in a reformatory at Vancouver. The young lad's mother has been dead for some years and his father is not in the city. He has consequently been given in charge to the police. The following cablegram from the High Commissioner's office in London yesterday, concerning the illness of D. S. McKenzie, deputy minister of education, who is in a hospital with typhoid fever: "Mr. McKenzie progressing favorably. His temperature normal. Says himself he is feeling better."

MAY HAVE WIRELESS STATION. Within the next two or three years Edmonton will have a wireless telegraph station. The plans of the United Wireless Telegraph company are being carried out. T. Ransome, agent of that company for some time on Vancouver Island, is in the city at present on a business trip. He stated that his company were planning to erect inland wireless telegraph stations in every city of a population of 10,000 and upward in the United States and Canada in the next few years.

The United Wireless Telegraph company is a combination of a number of smaller wireless companies. It has a large number of wireless telegraph stations in both the east and west coasts of America and has also several stations in Canada. The only station in Canada at present is situated on Vancouver Island on the Pacific coast. Mr. Ransome is very enthusiastic over the possibilities of wireless telegraph and believes the time is not distant when it will completely supersede ordinary wire telegraph and telephone lines. The cost of installing a wireless telegraph station is not as high as that of installing a wire telegraph station, and the operating expenses are not more than one-twentieth as great.

SPECIAL UNIVERSITY CLASSES. On Saturday morning at 10 o'clock the first class in physics for university students will be opened in Alberta University. A large number have already signed their intention of taking these classes. Any other wishing to join should be present at the opening class tomorrow morning. The special class for teachers has not yet been started, as the university authorities are waiting for the street railway between Edmonton and Strathcona to be put in operation. It is expected that this class will be started early next week.

ANOTHER FIRE HALL NEEDED. The need of another fire hall in the northern part of the city is daily becoming more evident, especially with the late fire works, when there have

been a number of fires on Norwood boulevard and other portions of Norwood. The run over by the east end fire on Kinistone street and the bomb one to the boulevard and over bad streets, especially in wet weather. With the growth of the city and the increasing number of houses, the G.T.P. shops, another fire hall will become an absolute necessity. That something should be done towards securing a site at least at the present time is the opinion of many citizens in that section.

GAS PRODUCER PLANT WORKING. The gas producer plant was put into operation for a short time again yesterday afternoon but did not run through the entire evening as some further changes were deemed necessary. Today another start will be made and it is expected that the new machine will run right through until tomorrow. If the arrangements work out satisfactorily the plant will be used to supply the gas for the street railway and the motors in use throughout the city, while the gas producer plant will be used for house lighting. The street railway authorities expect to have the four cars ready here and equipped on the line tomorrow and there is a possibility that the line to Strathcona may also be in operation in order to give the large excursion expected from Calgary an idea of real city life.

FIRE AT NORWOOD. About half-past eleven this morning an alarm was given for a fire on Norwood boulevard, for a fire in the house of G. Hager, 30 York street. The call was responded to by No. 3 fire hall, but when the Chief arrived he sent in another call for No. 1 station, as the fire threatened to spread. The bridge and the house were a defective fire, which caused the blaze to spread between the walls. After the flames had been extinguished and an inspection was made of the interior, an old lady occupant, who had just returned, rushed in, and under an undisturbed condition of mind she stated that she had seen two large wall-bills filled with rolls of bills. There was in the neighborhood of \$200 in the wall-bills, which had been hidden.

LAW STUDENT'S BANQUET. The Law Students' Society of Northern Alberta is an organization which although young in years, is strong and virile. Its strength and virility were abundantly shown at a banquet given in honor of Mr. James T. J. Colquhoun and Mr. R. B. A. Rae, B. A., on the occasion of their admission to the bar of Alberta. About twenty gathered at 9 o'clock in the evening at the home of Mr. Colquhoun, which occupied the attention of the loyal "sublights" for several hours. The menu was most excellent, consisting of purple and white, the colors of the society. The banquet was presided over by Mr. Colquhoun, who in his address referred to the success of the society in the past year and the prospect for the future. The evening closed with a prayer by Rev. J. McKinnon.
