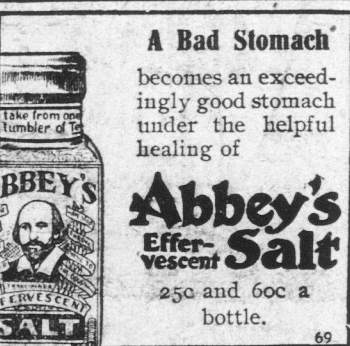

Capt. Jacobs Killed at the Dry Dock.

Capt. John Jacobs of the tug Petrel (R. N. Co.), met with an accident on board the steamer at the R. N. Co. pier this forenoon, which resulted in his death about an hour afterwards, at his late residence, Brass Square. He was working on the deck of the tug and assisting to lower a punt when the latter suddenly fell over, and jammed Capt. Jacobs against the davit. The full weight of the punt fell on his chest and broke several of his ribs. He was taken up unconscious and driven to his home in a sleigh. Dr. Paterson went to attend him immediately, but though he did all that could possibly be accomplished, the suffering man passed away about 1 o'clock without having regained consciousness. Capt. Jacobs was about 55 years of age and was highly esteemed by the Reid Mfd. Co. The Telegram extends its sympathy.

Quebec Will Stick to Her Pulpwood.

Special to Evening Telegram. QUEBEC, This Morning. Amidst applause from both sides of the House, Sir L. Gouin told the Legislature that the Quebec Government had no intention of departing from the policy adopted last April which requires that all pulpwood on Crown Lands shall be at least partly manufactured before being exported. The question, Sir Lomet stated, is: "Shall we accept the offer from Washington and go back on our Order in Council and let our pulpwood go into the market of the States to be made into pulp and paper there? I have not heard any argument to make us change our minds."

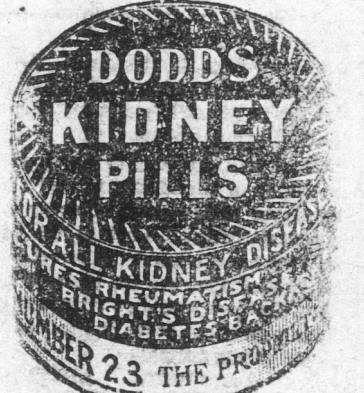
Remarkable Cure

London, March 1.—Dr. George Robertson, superintendent of the Royal Edinburgh Asylum for the Insane, in a report published in the Scotsman, marvels at the cures of the insane, in a few cases.

The first was of a woman who was suffering from mania. She became childish, heard imaginary voices and had strange delusions. A tablet prepared from the thyroid gland of a sheep was given to her. She was transformed from a misshapen, stupid being to a bright, intelligent woman.

The second case was that of a woman whose affliction was due to excess of a secretion of thyroid in the blood. She was treated with serum from a goat, the thyroid gland of which had been removed. She rapidly recovered.
