Unjust Scheme.

Editor Evening Telegram:
Dear Sir.—Please allow me space in the people's popular paper for a few remarks re the Teachers' Pension Scheme as it now stands after receiving some very peculiar alterations. Every disinterested person who takes the trouble to give it a thought must admit that the present arrangement is most unjust. Can any person anywhere point to any other scheme in any connection whatever in which the subscribers pay a uniform premium and receive therefrom benefits in proportion to their salaries received while actively engaged in their particular calling? Teachers cannot be classed with civil servants in this matter, as no civil servants in this Colony pay premiums, and therefore what they receive as pensions comes directly from the Government and at the discretion of the Government. If they paid equal premiums no doubt they would be natural enough to expect equal pensions. If those responsible for the meagre, sordid alterations made in Dr. Pilot's fair and equitable scheme want to receive higher pensions than the great majority of the fraternity, let them purchase them with higher premiums, and not act as parasites on their poorer brethren. If this is the sort of good things the N. T. A. is going to obtain for the teachers, the sooner the outport teachers sever their connection therefrom the better. One wonders why the Superintendents did not interfere when they saw the wholesale wrong about to be enacted. If the great friend of teachers, Rev. Dr. Pilot, were in the field to-day such an audacious scheme would never have been engendered. But unfortunately for the teachers he is not, and his place as friend of teachers has not been filled. He did not soar and view matters from the ethereal blue, but stood right on the mundane sphere and looked after the interest of the teachers, and encouraged both them

and their children. He never tried to use teachers as mirrors to reflect his greatness. But to return to the pension scheme, the outport teachers should become as one over it and sever themselves from the N. T. A. at once, and form themselves into a protective union, and have a memorial ready by the time the Hon. Sir Robert Bond comes into power, who, no doubt, would rather answer the prayers of the under dogs than acquiesce to the pandering few. We notice The Evening Telegram has shown up the injustice of the scheme. Go ahead, Mr. Editor, it is not the first time The Evening Telegram has helped the under dogs in the fight.

The big new engines 113 and 114 are being brought to a finish and should be ready to go into commission about the latter part of April. The foundations for 6 more new engines have been laid and work on these will be pushed ahead by Supt. Turnbull as rapidly as possible.

Another Storm.

The snow storm which began here about 9 last night and which raged up till 1 a.m. to-day was felt along the railway line and on the S. W. Coast during the early afternoon, and lasted several hours. The wind blew with much violence from the S. W. and a good deal of snow fell along the line of railway.

MR. CLIFT HOLDS THE FLOOR.

On the Speaker announcing said bill, Mr. Clift rose to explain that he had not seen a copy of the bill, nor did he think that the Opposition had been furnished with a copy of same. Whereupon he was interrupted by the Premier, so much so that the Speaker had to call on him to take his seat. Now, sir, the point is this: Mr. Clift had a perfect right to make the statement that he had not seen the bill, nor did he think a copy had been placed before the Opposition; but the way he was interrupted by the Premier is another matter. He asserted that the bill had been distributed a week ago, and that if the hon. member had not received a copy it was not his fault. It appears to me, sir, that the Premier loves criticism, but you must not criticise. I am glad to see that the Speaker is awakening to a sense of his duty, and hope that the Chairman of Committee will follow suit. It is high time that a sense of fair play was exhibited in the House, whether it be the last or the second last session of the Assembly. No one present at last evening's session could fail to see the antagonistic manner of Sir Edward Morris, both in words and looks; but it did not have the desired effect of making Mr. Clift keep his seat when it came to him to assert his right. The Premier also attempted to browbeat Mr. Clapp, but failed egregiously.

Mr. Editor, it can all be summed up in a few words: Sir Edward knows his day is done, and he is not particular whether his language is parliamentary or not. He also knows that Bond is his master, and with Kent as Bond's able lieutenant, people are too wise to be gulled with all that he (Sir Edward) would like them to take down.
