A correspondent of the Chronicle who was with the Turkish Command-er-in-Chief, during part of the operations, calls the Battle of Thrace an appalling and terrible defeat, 40,000 of the flower of the Turkish troops having fallen, while Abdullah Pasha himself narrowly escaped the fate of 75 per cent of his artillery, who were made captives.

PARIS, Nov. 4.

The French Government has refus ed the appeal of the Turkish government to take the initiative bringing about intervention by the great Powers to stop hostilities and impose an armstice on the Balkan States. The French Foreign points out that for France to take the course suggested would be con-trary to international law, and would make her appear as siding against the Balkan States. France can only, it was added, consider, in accord with all the great Powers, a request for mediation, properly so called, if suc a request be addressed to her.

SOFIA, Nov. 4. The Bulgarain troops have now oc-cupied Buk, on the Saloniki-Constan-tinople railroad, and this, with the possession of Nevellop, finally cuts off communication between the Turkish army in Macedonia and the Turkish garrison of Adrianople. Turkish roops on Saturday attacked the Bulgarian left flank, but were repulsed and put to flight, the Bulgarians cap turing five officers and 1,300 men, i The spoils captured by the Bulgar-ains at Lule Burgas included depot of clothing, arms, stores, fifteer of clothing, arms, stores, fifteen camels, search-lights, and telegraphic nstruments. Prisoners taken by th Bulgarians say that a Prussian icers named Tenteil, who held the was killed by his own men after th lisastrous action at Lule Burgas. The prisoners say they went into action in a famished condition. The men had received only one biscuit or a hall oaf of bread for three or four days Many of them deserted to the Bulgar

Advances of the Servians toward Monastir and Saloniki are progress ing successfully. The defeat of the urks at Kumanova was so complete that the pursuing Servians found the Curkish troops had abandoned the mpregnable positions of Katchanil Pass and Ovihpolia where it was expected would be the scene of desperete resistance. When the Servians reached the Pass they found the Turks had fled in the wildest confuson, leaving twenty-one guns, nume ous rifles and piles of ammunition. As Cratora the Turks left one hundred and thirty field guns behind them.

The French attitude in regard he Turkish appeal for mediation shared by England and Russia. Th Turkish proposals are as follows: Frst, that the Powers offer, and need be, enforce an amsistice on the belligerents; second, that the Powers profit by the armistice to invite the belligerents to make known to them the terms of peace necessary to har-nonize the conflicting terms of the belligerents. In refusing to act Permier Poincaire declared France was unable to accept the suggestion about the armistice without furnish ing the Bulkan allies guarantees re'ative to conditions of peace. A armistice. Poincaire said, would check he advance of the allies at the heigh of their victories, and give the Turks ime to re-organize and strength their armies.
