Britain Has Refused

Lotteries. Strange Effect of Action.

There is now in the possession of the British Red Cross Society the most valuable collection of pearls ever got together, but the Red Cross is considerably embarrassed to do with the pearls. Of course, it wants to dispose of them in some way, for the pearls were not given by means of a being used as ornaments. The Red Cross directors for some time when they did work out a plan to answer the House of Commons in and vetoed it. The Red Cross scheme was to sell the pearls by means of a lottery which had been the greatest lottery in the world. It appeared, since the House of Lords, in spite of the objections of the Lords, in spiritual form, as it would have plain sailing in the House, especially as it had the approval of the great masses

of the people, but it came up before a slim attendance, and through the carelessness of its promoters as much as for any other reason was beaten.

The collection of some 3,300 pearls was gathered as the result of an appeal to wealthy and well-to-do people to contribute one pearl each. Some pearls of great price were sent in to the Red Cross, and it is calculated that the value now in hand ranges between £200,000 and £2,000,000. The former sum would be realized if the pearls were sold by auction, and the latter sum was expected as the result of a lottery. Naturally enough the Red Cross wanted to make as much money as possible out of the pearls and decided to hold a lottery. In coming to this decision it was supported by the fact that since the war began there have been thousands perhaps tens of thousands of lotteries held in England in aid of various war charities, and that in some of them, Mrs. Lloyd George and the Lord Mayor of London have not hesitated to draw the winning numbers. Nevertheless, lotteries are against the law. These lotteries have had the backing of British public opinion, and on this account the police have main-

GATHERED FROM EVERYWHERE.

Every Canadian soldier coming back from the front, will, after his discharge, be carried on the pay-list for three months.

During the war the Admiralty transport service has conveyed twenty-two millions soldiers with a loss of 4,391; 120,000,000 tons of naval and military stores and two million animals.

London's 22,000 policemen guard more than 4,000 miles of streets and roads, and at least 1,250,000 houses and shops.

John Ward, a negro, of Goldsborough, North Carolina, has thirteen of his eighteen sons in the 9th and 10th United States Cavalry, while his seventeen daughters are engaged on war-work.

Messrs. Cadbury Bros. have given £10,000 to the relief of war victims connected with the works, £10,000 towards the provision of pensions and £10,000 for provision of supplementary pensions.

In the coming British elections, 6,000,000 women will vote for the first time and 2,000,000 men have been added to the last electoral list. The question is how will this new electorate vote?

There is a two-year accumulation of raw rubber in Brazil waiting for ships to deliver it to countries where there is a rubber shortage. The accumulation is the result of war-time shipping restrictions.

December 7 is to be celebrated in the United States as "Britain Day," and the New York Herald announces on that date there will be a nationwide tribute to the magnificent part played by Great Britain in the war, special emphasis to be laid on the work of the British navy.

The capture of Mons was the brightest jewel in the crown of British victory. After long years the blood of those gallant men of the first British Expeditionary Force, the old "Contemptibles," has been gloriously avenged.

Over 105,000 members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force have expressed the definite wish to take up farming in Canada after the war. This figure was obtained by interviewing 320,000 members of the forces overseas, and indicates that 42.5 per cent of these men wish to go on the land.

A memorial monument to Edith Cavell and the Canadian nurses who were killed by the Germans in raids on Canadian hospitals will be erected in Ottawa in Major Hill Park. The monument will be erected by public subscriptions and grants from the Dominion. The monument is being executed by Hamilton McCarthy, R.C.A., the well-known Canadian sculptor.

Post-War Conditions.

Nfld. Scotch Cured Herring

Although the pre-war demand for Newfoundland Scotch cured herring has not yet manifested itself in New York, it is interesting to note that stocks of winter and spring herring are very light and that the trade is turning its attention to the fall pack and the matter of packers' prices. While there are no reports of sales to New York importers available, it is understood that some offerings are now being considered, and some counter offers have been made by the trade here. The opinion prevails in the trade that Newfoundland packers have their ideas too high, and there is reason to believe that if this attitude persists, there will be comparatively little Newfoundland fall herring purchased from this source. The trade in New York sets up the contention that packers have been guided almost entirely by selling prices in New York.

The following extract from the Monthly Commercial Letter (November) issued by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, applies directly to Newfoundland as well as Canada and we will do well to heed its admonitory counsel:

"The coming of peace will not justify any relaxation in our efforts to increase the thrift and economy of the nation in order to keep the public purse filled. Fighting may soon end, but our men will require to 'stand to' for an indefinite period, until many difficult international problems have been settled, and in the meantime the war-racked and devastated countries of Europe must be supplied with many necessities. In providing these the burden of the financial aid required will fall upon those of the Allies who are able to supply the necessary funds from their own resources.

"The industrial welfare of Canada for some time after the cessation of the war will depend largely upon the manner in which individual enterprise is gradually substituted for the government control of business which has prevailed during the war. During this period of transition the Government will be justified in using its credit on a diminishing scale for effecting the change. Employment for those of our people who have done good service in the manufacture of munitions may be provided by new foreign business, which, pending the determination of the important geographical and political questions arising out of the war, will be controlled largely by the allied Governments. Only if they are backed by a full public purse, can our representatives at the allied councils confidently assume the responsibility for a large share of the rehabilitation which is immediately necessary. If the country is to be saved from a period of serious industrial depression, it is of the utmost importance that our people should not relax their efforts to save, so that they may be enabled to give generous financial support to the Government whenever needed. To provide for the cost of demobilizing our expeditionary forces and for our share in restoring the war-devastated areas, additional Government loans will be necessary from time to time, though on a lesser scale than during the war.

"Those undertaking new enterprises should not be obliged to wait for the direction of the Government, but should be able to rely upon its encouragement and protection. While the peace plenipotentiaries are settling boundaries and indemnities, the springs of normal trade will commence to flow. New goods will have to be found for new markets, new problems of credit and transportation will have to be faced and those who handle them with skill and tact will secure the victories of peace."
