## "Seal" Arrives From Icefields.

BROUGHT ONLY 26 PELTS.

Baine Johnston's steamer Seal, Capt. Randall, the first arrival from the icefields, made port early yesterday morning, with only 26 young and old hoods—one of the smallest catches on record. She was well inside the Narrows at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, the Captain claims, being off the wharf by 2.10.

As is generally known, the Seal struck hard luck from the beginning. Forcing her way through the ice-jamb she broke off one blade of her propeller. On Monday last it was decided to cut in towards the land, hoping to get into thin ice and work further North, but next morning two more blades were lost, leaving the ship with only one. Then, as coal was running short, it was considered best to abandon the voyage and return to port. Her crippled condition prevented speed, and it was not until Saturday night that she got out of the ice near Baccalieu. The weather all through the voyage, unfortunately, was moderate—unfortunately, because had it been rough the ice would have been broken up, thereby allowing the ship to get through. With the exception of a few heavy colds, no sickness was experienced on the Seal.

## Greater Protection for City.

MOTOR TRUCKS ORDERED FOR FIRE COMPANIES.

It will be learned with interest that Inspector General of Police C. H. Hutchings has, in pursuance of his ambition to put the Police and Fire forces to top-notch condition, ordered two new motor trucks for the Central Station—one an accommodation truck and the other a chemical. They should arrive by the end of the month and eventually others will be ordered for the Eastern and Western Companies. In all cities abroad the horse trucks are retreating before motors and, in order that St. John's shall not be too far behind in the swim, the present move has been made. The machines to arrive are two combination chemical and hose, motor driven trucks, each with 60 gallon tanks, 1000 feet hose, 200 feet chemical hose, 24 feet extra ladder and roof ladder, and are for use in down-town fires, the old trucks to be kept in reserve for fires on the higher levels.

## Household Notes.

Bread pudding can be made with dry cocoa added to it. The powder should be mixed to a paste with water before adding to the milk and bread.

A good cleaning fluid is made of a bar of good white soap, dissolved in boiling water; add one pint of ammonia and two pints of clear water and shake.

Peel and quarter apples, arrange in baking dish and add 1/2 cupful of sugar or honey and 1 teaspoonful of vanilla extract; then dot the apples with butter and bake.

Souffled squash is a pleasant change. Cook the squash, mash, season with butter, salt and pepper. To 2 cups of the squash add 1 cup of cream, when thoroughly mixed; yolks of 2 eggs, well beaten, and finally the well-beaten whites. Turn into a pudding dish and bake until firm.
