The friends of the two men belonging to Silver Fox Island, who were drowned in the loss of the schooner "Passport" wish to extend to the good people of Caplin Cove, Bay de Verde, their sincerest thanks for their unweary toll searching for the bodies of the lost men, and also for every act of sympathy and respect shown to them after their recovery. It was, indeed, a great consolation to have had the sad privilege of committing their bodies to the earth. That they have found a place of sepulture amongst their friends and relatives is due to the diligence and care exercised by the people of Caplin Cove and vicinity in their efforts to recover the bodies. They wish also to thank Magistrate Vatcher for his many acts of kindness and the care with which he looked after every detail, and the Government for arranging for the bodies to be sent home. They desire also, too, to say how grateful they feel to the Greenspond people, who kindly cared for the bodies after their arrival there, and who conveyed them over the six miles of stormy water which separates Silver Fox Island from Greenspond. The two unfortunate men were Christopher Rogers, aged 26, married, leaves a wife and two small children. Thomas Button, aged 24, leaves a wife and one child. The funeral of the former took place on December 14, and the latter on Dec. 17.—COM. Silver Fox Island, B.B., Dec. 27, 1921.

#### Undesirable Passenger.

HELD PENDING ENQUIRY.

A man giving his name as Charles Taylor, aged 29 years, was taken in charge by immigration officer Dooley Sunday on the arrival of the Kyle from Port aux Basques. The fellow had only \$1.00 on his person and was being sent back into Canada by the Newfoundland authorities. Not wishing to make North Sydney a dumping place, and for other reasons, the immigration official held the man, who is now in the cooler, and unless there is something coming from the United States authorities, he will be sent back on the steamer Kyle this evening.

(Thus the North Sydney Herald of Dec. 27). Taylor said he passed through here only a few weeks ago, but as there is nothing on the outward list of passengers showing any verification for this, the statement is taken with considerable doubt. The fellow, who says he is the son of George Taylor, agent of the Union Central Co., Minneapolis, told the immigration official that he served in the U.S. army, but has nothing to show that he ever served in any capacity overseas, not even a button. He said his home is in Duluth, but his last place of residence was Halifax, where he domiciled for about a month. He has no stated calling except as laborer. Passengers on the steamer coming here say that Taylor was taken in custody by the Newfoundland police as a suspect in connection with the burning of a store at Bay of Islands, but he stoutly denies this. Failing to get something definite from the fellow's relatives, he will be deported to-night by immigration officer Dooley.
