

A PIECE OF SHARP PRACTICE THAT MISCARRIED.—A singular transaction has been brought to light in connection with the affairs of an insolvent in the city, which seems to over-reach the benefit of the insolvent, who has been made the victim of misplaced confidence. A merchant who recently closed his establishment, state that previous to suspending he removed a quantity of goods from his store and deposited them together with a sum of money, in the hands of another merchant with whom he was on friendly terms, with the intention of saving something from the wreck of his business. Since the effects of the insolvent were taken in charge by his creditors, he waited upon his friend to draw a portion of the money made over, but that party refused to disgorge, and positively denied that he was in any way his debtor. The insolvent then made affidavit that he had deposited money and goods as stated, whereupon a counter statement was made that the insolvent had never paid for goods in question. The creditors of the insolvent having got hold of the affair, have also, it is reported, instituted an action to recover the goods made way with. Altogether the affairs of the defunct house are exceedingly mixed. The amount of property involved in the transaction is reported to be \$3,500 worth of dry goods, and \$350 in cash. The insolvent merchant charged at the betrayal of confidence on the part of his supporter, will now testify on half of his creditors.—*Hamilton Times.*

The business entrusted to the Irish Church Commission is comprised in the three particulars of inquiring into the revenues connected with the bishoprics, dignities, and benefices; the number of the members of the Church of England in the various parishes; and the means of reforming present evils. The Commission has power to summon witnesses and administer an oath, as well as to examine all records and documents. It will thus be seen that the duties and powers of the Commissioners are very extensive, and some useful fruit may be expected from their labors.

The Newmarket *Evng*, of the 15th, inst., records the death of Joseph Gould, Esq., of Uxbridge, at one time member for North Ontario. He met with an accident the previous week, having fallen from the top of a building he was assisting to erect, as an addition to his woolen factory, by which four of his ribs were broken, and other injuries sustained, which eventually resulted in his death.

New Cannon.—A Mr. Claxton, director of the Belgian Artillery, has constructed a sort of cannon-revolver, consisting of eight cannons, which will fire 80 to 100 shots in a minute. There are only two fired a time; and when they become too hot, two others, and so on. These cannon throw grape-shot from 1,000 to 3,000 feet, according to charge. The whole is mounted upon a frame protected with sheet-iron, so that the artillerymen are sheltered.

A petition is being signed among members, asking that the first part of the session may be considered a full session, with \$800 pay, and the balance in the spring, at \$6 a day while at last.

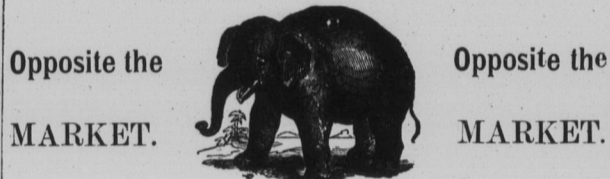
