

WATERPAYERS HAVE NOMINATED THEIR CIVIC CANDIDATES

Ald. Adshad Receives Endorsement as Mayoralty Candidate; Mrs. Gale and Messrs. Bull, Knight, Geo. E. Williams for Aldermanic Slate

Eight ratepayers' associations were represented at the meeting last night of the Federated Ratepayers' association, called for the purpose of nominating candidates for the various civic boards for 1918.

Ald. Adshad received the nomination for mayor, Mrs. W. J. Gale, president of the Women's Ratepayers' association, and Messrs. F. G. Bull, vice-president of the federation, Jos. Knight, president of the federation, and Geo. E. Williams, president of the federation, received the endorsement of the federation for the aldermanic board.

W. A. Gidley, president of the South Calgary association, was the unanimous choice of the federation for school trustees, and J. R. Harris, of the Parkview association, was nominated for the hospital board.

Dr. Orman, president of the Crescent Heights association, was opposed to nominating any candidates to the council on the ground that the present administration of business men had allowed the city into the receivers' hands and were now dropping out and leaving it to the working men and others to carry the burden and bear the blame.

Ald. Adshad was nominated by W. J. Calbeck, of the Tuxedo Park association, and the nomination was seconded by D. Orman.

To Give Speech Later
Ald. Adshad, while appreciating the honor conferred on him, did not have his nomination speech ready, and asked to be permitted to give his answer at the next meeting two weeks hence.

Mrs. Gale was not absolutely certain that she would continue in the contest, but said she was pleased to let her name go to nomination for the purpose of ascertaining the mind of the men on the subject of women entering civic politics. She did not expect or want to receive any special treatment other than that which is accorded to men, as she fully realized that, when women enter into public life they must be willing to submit to the criticism which is part of the price of public service.

Two Days a Week
F. G. Bull has not yet decided whether he can afford to give the time required of an alderman and wishes to inquire further into the demands on the time of an alderman. He understood that it took two days per week of a man's time. Ald. Adshad, upon being appealed to, suggested that two days was about the right estimate.

Jos. Knight was not present. But it was generally understood that he was willing to let his name stand.

G. E. Williams agreed to accept the nomination. He could give the time required because his professional duties required him to attend all the committee meetings and all the regular meetings of the city council anyway.

W. A. Gidley wished to wait for a few more acceptable men should be nominated by the local associations. But the members present were confident that they could not find a better qualified man.

Hospital Questions
When J. R. Harris was nominated Mrs. Gale, who nominated him, spoke very appreciatively of the work of the hospital board for the current year.

Mr. Orman, on the contrary, wanted an explanation of the stand that the hospital board had taken on several occasions during the year, and the present attitude toward public ownership.

Mr. Harris, however, was able to give such a good account of his stewardship that his nomination was unanimously endorsed.

Mr. Orman did not favor taking the hospital over as a public utility if it was to be exploited for the purpose of making money with which to reduce taxation as has been suggested by some of the business men in connection with other utilities.

There will be another meeting of the federation on Tuesday, November 13, for the purpose of making further arrangements with respect to the civic campaign.

Local Merchants Generally Adverse to Checking Freedom of Employees' Choice as to Length of Occupation

The act for the protection of persons employed in factories, shops and office buildings, which will be enforced in Calgary next Monday for the first time, is the subject of much comment among the business men of the city.

Many who are opposed to the act refuse to discuss it in any way, while others declare it is a hold-up. Others are in favor of legislation that leaves the individual free to make his choice if he or she wants to work overtime, and point to the fact that as it becomes imperative to close on Saturday night, it works a hardship on a great majority of the public who are not paid until Saturday night.

Would Go Further
Mr. Herbert G. H. Glass, of Glass Bros., shoe dealers, and chairman of the retail section of the board of trade, expressed his own personal opinion, and not that of any part of the board of trade, as being in favor of closing up all stores and business houses at 8 o'clock on Saturday night and during the Christmas holidays.

As this is a more radical departure than the factory act itself, Mr. Glass expressed his opinion in favor of such an amendment to the act, and said that such a measure would eliminate the double shift, and it would be fair to everyone, so that if one closed up, all would have to do so.

The management of the Hudson's Bay company's store refused to express any opinion, saying that the question had not been taken up as yet.

The act is a bone of contention in business circles, and some warm criticism of the provisions is being heard on all sides.

SALE OF TAX CERTIFICATES
NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the Treasurer of the City of Calgary, at his office at the City Hall, Calgary, on and after the 25th day of November, 1917, will sell to the first applicant Certificates of Delinquency for unpaid taxes levied or assessed prior to the 1st day of January, 1916, on the land included in the list—printed copies of which may be had on personal or written application to the Treasurer or City Clerk, City Hall, Calgary—if such taxes with interest and costs are not sooner paid.

Why Tax Certificates Are An Attractive Investment
They take priority as security on real estate over mortgages and other encumbrances. They may bear interest at 10 per centum per annum, preference being given to the lender offering to purchase a certificate at the lowest rate of interest.

They cannot be redeemed within one year unless the holder is paid the total amount thereof, plus one-tenth of such amount. If unredeemed within three years, the holder, by simple procedure, can sell the property to recoup himself the amount thereof, with interest borne by the certificate, plus subsequent taxes paid by the purchaser, with interest thereon at 10 per centum per annum, plus all costs, and if no sale, title to the property may be obtained.

They bear the guarantee of the City that, if set aside by the Court for any reason, the City will pay the holder the amount thereof, plus 6 per centum per annum.

For fuller particulars, including the method of tendering, prospective purchasers are invited to obtain and read the introduction contained in the printed list.

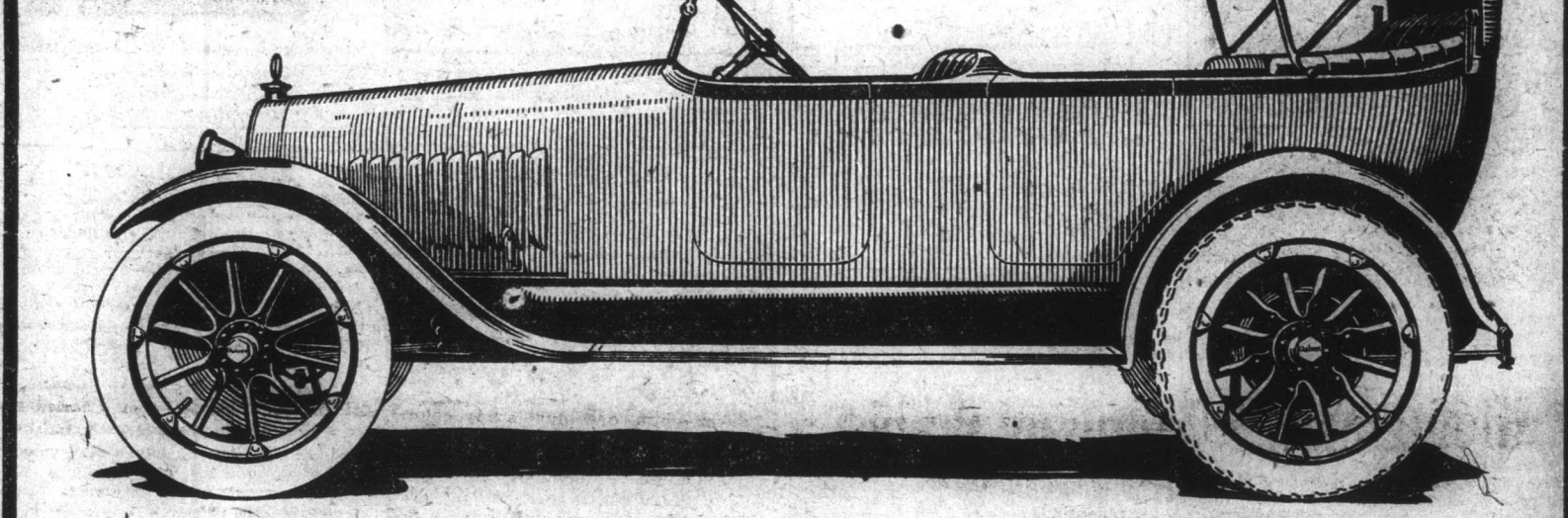
