Hundreds of Dervishes Slain While Retreating.

CANADIAN AFFAIRS DISCUSSED. London, Sept. 25.-A Rome dispatch to the Chronicle says that the Pope has granted an audience to the Bishop of Chicoutimi on electoral and educational questions in Canada.

AIDING THE SULTAN. Berlin, Sept. 24.-Prof. Thumayan, an Armenian, who came here for the purpose of organizing anti-Turkish meetings, has been expelled from the city by the police authorities. The professor lectured for a long time in England

THE DEATH ROLL. Constantinople, Sept. 25.-It now appears that a thousand Armenians were cilled during the recent massacre at Egin, in the Kharput district; and it is reported that one hundred Armenians have been killed at Divrig, in the same villayet.

BESSIE BELLWOOD DEAD. London, Sept. 25.—Bessie Bellwood, a music hall singer, who became widely known through her relations with the Duke of Manchester, and subsequently with the late Marquis of Aylesbury, died last evening from heart disease. She was 39 years old.

THE PORTE WAKING UP. London, Sept. 25 .- A Constantinople dispatch to the Berlin Lokalanzeiger says that the diplomats in the Turkish captial have been instructed to suspend their conferences on the Armenian question, as direct negotiations are pending between the Porte and the

BRITISH PUSHING ON. Dongola, on the Nile, Sept. 24.-An Inspection of the Dervish defenses at this place shows that they were constructed with great skill, that the positions were well chosen, and that if they had been held by resolute men they would have caused an immense amount of trouble and loss to the Anglo-Egyptian expedition, About 900 Dervish prisoners were captured, in addition to the large quantity of arms of all kinds, dates sufficient to support an enormous fighting force for a long time, a great quantity of grain and a large supply of sheep and cattle. The honors of fighting fell to the gunboats and the artillery, whose shells reached the fleeing Dervishes far out in the desert. Deserters from the Dervish forces continue to arrive here, and they are all anxious to serve under the Egyptian flag. The work of perfecting the chain of depots and forts connecting this place with Wady Halfa is being pushed with the greatest energy, and from here work on the railroad embankment begins tomorrow, so as to join the line being pushed southward as quickly as possible. All the troops are in excellent health and spirits, and the provisions captured have considerably strengthened the position of the sirdar. Was Buried Alive.

Fell Into the Hole Which He Was Ligging Himself.

W. P. Cooper, of Hamilton, Came to His Death by a Most Distressing Accident.

Hamilton, Sept. 25.-Early yesterday Wm. P. Cooper, a shoemaker employed at McPherson's, but who was not working, started to excavate a small hole in a vacant lot south of the T., H. and B. track, on Bailey street, to locate the sewer pipes which had been left there some months ago when the house on the lot was torn down. He laid his coat on the ground close by. and his dog sat down beside it. About 9 o'clock Robert Graham, B. B. Jones and others saw Cooper digging, and at noon they noticed the coat and the dog there, but the hole was filled in. About 5 o'clock the coat and the dog noticed in the surface of the ground. A couple of hours later John T. Laing, who owned the lot, and had employed Cooper, went down to see what was the matter, as Mrs. Cooper had gone to his house to find out why her husband had not been home to dinner. He began to dig, and was assisted by other men, who dug up the body of Cooper. The bank had caved in on him early in the morning. He was about 25 years old. An inquest will likely be held.

OUR WESTERN MINES

Bright Outlook for the Ensuing Year's Development,

Rossland letter to Vancouver World. "What do you think will be the output of Trail Creek camp for the calyear of 1896?" was the question asked by a local mining man, who is well known for his knowledge of the doings of the camp.

"This matter was up for discussion by a number of mining men, and I will give you the figures we arrived at, and we came to the conclusion they are conservative, and that the total given will be below the actual total at the end of the year. We came to the conclusion that the Le Roi will ship 50,000 tons of ore, valued at around \$2,000,000. The War Eagle and Iron Mask combined will produce 19,-000 tons of ore, valued at \$770,000. The Josie will add 5,000 tons, or \$2,000,000 to the total, while the ore from the Mayflower, Crown Point, O. K., Nickel Plate and Cliff will aggregate 2,000,000 tons, or a value of at least \$100,000. making a grand total of \$3,070,000 for

the year. "Of course," said he, "those figures do not include any shipments from the Center Star, Jumbo, Evening Star, or City of Spokane. All mines with shipping ore in the dump, and quantities of it in sight in the mines, and it is conceded that nearly all of these mines will ship continually on the completion of the Red Mountain Rail-

way. An analysis of these figures shows that the camp will produce 76,000 tons of ore at an estimated value of \$3,070,000 which will add to the wealth of the world as follows: 133,000 ounces of gold, or \$2,600,000; 3,377,777 pounds of copper, valued at \$304,000, and 193,333 ounces of silver, valued at \$106,000. This seems to be the most accurate and interesting estimate of the production of the camp for the year yet made, and will be generally accepted as very
