MOSTLY FAIR.

Toronto, Ont., Aug. 27—11 p.m.—The pressure is highest over the Northwest Territories and Maritime Provinces. There is a small depression moving slowly across the lake region and an important West Indies storm near the coast of the South Atlantic States. A few showers have occurred in Ontario to-day, but the weather in the Dominion has been generally fine. Minimum and maximum temperatures: Esquimaux, 48°-70°; Calgary, 44°-70°; Edmonton, 36°-70°; Prince Albert, 42°-70°; Qu'Appelle, 38°-68°; Winnipeg, 45°-70°; Toronto, 64°-78°; Montreal, 65°-80°; Quebec, 56°-78°; Halifax, 52°-78°.

Londoners on the Sarnia.

Mr. Joseph Lancaster, of this city, is one of the passengers on the long-overdue steamship Sarnia, and his friends and relatives are commencing to feel somewhat anxious. The boat is over four weeks overdue, outward bound, and has not been heard from since spoken off Newfoundland near the beginning of the voyage. Her machinery was then disabled, but assistance was declined.

Presentation at the Barracks.

On Saturday Mr. J. Holland was waited upon by a few old friends at the Military School and presented with a gold watch-chain and an address. A C. P. R. Conductor Shot.

Conductor Sidney Smith, of the C. P. R., was shot by a tramp between Galt and Drumbo at 8 o'clock on Sunday morning. Four of the itinerant fraternity were riding on the train and Mr. Smith was putting them off when one of them drew a revolver and fired at his lower limbs. The ball took effect in the right leg below the knee. The train hands caught the tramp and bound him by ropes to the stove in the caboose. At Woodstock he was handed over to the officials and on being searched a revolver, a knife and \$65 in cash were found on him. So much money on the person of a tramp must have surprised the searchers, for said tramp watched his opportunity, and throwing himself out of the window, he was soon over the hills and far away. Mr. Smith brought his train on to London, where he was removed to his home on Fair Mall street. The doctor recovered the bullet, and Mr. Smith is progressing favorably. Was this the same gang of tramps that raided the C. T. R. station at Drumbo, and by whom Mrs. Weaver was shot?
