A POSTOFFICE CHANGE.

The Railway Service to be Distinct Nief Clerks to be Superintendents-Efficiency Increased

The new "Railway Mail Service Branch" of the Postoffice Department Toronto, will take charge, with the the title of Controller. He will have exclusive supervision of the railway mail heretofore, concern themselves with ter. railway work. The chief railway mail clerks will be styled superintendents. The clerks in the cities of Halifax, St. Quebec, Montreal, Ottawa, Toronto, London, Winnipeg and Van-couver, whose duty it is to check the postal car returns, will also be included as part of the railway mail service branch.

In anticipation of a prospective shuffle in regard to the postal divisions the railway mail clerks serving in five divisions mentioned, hereafter will be placed under the direction of the superintendents in the cities, as follows: The railway mail clerks the Three Rivers division will be it charge of the superintendent of Quebec; of Sherbrooke in charge of the superintendent at Montreal; of Kingston and Barrie in charge of the su perintendent of Toronto, and of Stratford in charge of the superintendent, Mr. A. G. McWhinney, in London. All the changes mentioned involve a mplete separation between the duties postoffice inspector, and those of the controller of the railway mail ser ice branch.
