DIVORCED BY DEATH

Murder and Suicide the Seguel to Disagreement-Two Similar Cases.

Jackson, Mich., April 19.—David H. Creech, a capitalist, aged 70 years, and for 50 years, a resident of this city, shot his wife on the street yesterday afternoon, firing four builets into her head, neck and mouth, while he held her fast with his left arm about her waist. Mrs. Creech, who was 40 years old, was married to Creech twelve years ago. Previously she had been his housekeeper. They lived unhappily. Three years ago Mrs. Creech began divorce proceedings, and after they had made several futile attempts to live together again, she was granted a divorce. On Tuesday the supreme court affirmed the divorce, and yesterday's shooting was the result. Mr. Creech was arrested, and a second loaded revolver was found in his possession. He said he had intended to kill himself. Chicago, April 18.—Charles H. Sweeney, a wealthy cotton planter, of Greenville. Ky., today shot and killed his wife and then committed suicide in the apartments of his wife's sister, Mrs. W. L. Phillips, wife of a Chicago tobacco merchant, in the Dubuque flats, Rush street. Mrs. Sweeney left her home at Greensville a month since, coming to Chicago, it is said, for the purpose of securing a legal separation. Sweeney is said to have told his wife he would kill her if she persisted in suing for divorce.

CENSUS TAKING

Hon. David Mills Deprecates Charging Schedule to Provincial Government.

Lengthy Bebate on the Transportation Question in the House-Mr. Tarte Justifies Government's Canal Policy.

Ottawa, April 18 .- The transportation question again occupied the attention of the house during the whole sitting. Sir Louis Davies announced that an appropriation of \$400,000, asked for the improvements of the aids to navigation between Montreal and the sea, including a new light at Belle Isle, will be spent in improving existing lights, erecting new ones and providing additional buoys. Mr. Tarte justified the policy of the government in improving the canals, and spoke of the ad-vantage of the proposed French River and Lake Nipissing route, which, he calculated, would be some 900 miles shorter than the New York route. Mr. Fitzpatrick pointed out the disadvan-tages under which Montreal labored, and enumerated the natural advan-tages which Quebec possessed as a port which is open all the year round. After a debate, during which the whole question was thoroughly discussed, the amendment to the motion to go into supply, having served its purpose, was withdrawn, and the house adjourned at midnight.

Mr. Maclean asked if it was intended to have the 24th of May observed as a public holiday this year. Sir Wilfrid Laurier replied that there was a bill before the house dealing with the matter, and the public would be informed in due time.

IN THE SENATE. Sir Mackenzie Bowell drew attention to the political census circular alleged to the political census circular alleged to have been sent out in Ontario, and inquired what steps the government was taking in regard to it. From his long knowledge of the minister of justice, Sir Mackenzie did not believe Mr. Mills could have lant himself to cond. Mills could have lent himself to send-ing out this circular, which he attributed to the machinations of what was known as the Ontario machine. He termed the circular iniquitous, and ex- Wood pressed surprise that when the matter Screw was brought up in the Ontario house it White was lightly treated.

HON DAVID MILLS.

Hon. David Mills agreed with Sir Scrub Mackenzie Bowell in his views of a Sink party census, and admitted the unfairness of party work being done at the expense of the country. He was not surprised that Mr. Fisher, in the pressure of the session, was not aware of the matter until it came up in parliament. He himself did not know of it until he read the debate in the house. Mr. Fisher had placed in his hand answers stating that the schedule was not issued with the knowledge, consent or authority of any minister or official Immediately he knew of it, on April 15th, the circular read by Sir Mackenzie Bowell was wired to every census commissioner. It was no part of the policy of the government to take a politica census, and he deprecated charging the schedule to the provincial government. They were all strongly interested in the maintenance of their British constitutional government.

USED IN MAKING JEWELS BAKING

Some of the Ingredients Which Are Employed in the Manufacture of Sham Gems. To meet the growing demand for ar-

tificial jewelry, the process of making precious stones" has been greatly improved within the last few years, and its further development has enlisted the services of some of the most skillful chemists, says the Chicago Chron-The material chiefly used is glass,

but it is not the ordinary glass of commerce. It is prepared with the greatest care by highly skilled artisans, for upon its clearness and perfect homogeneity depend the quality of the imitation gems, which are far superior to the cheap grade of counterfeits that rely on silver backings This glass can only be made from

absolutely pure quartz, or, better still, from rock crystal, as quartz frequently contains minute veins of iron which would impair the clearness and color of the glass. The bicarbonate of potash and the oxide of lead which are mixed with it must also be chemically pure. Other ingredients of less import ance are borax, which promotes the flux, and a small quantity of arsenic. The best glass for imitation gems consists of rock crystal, 32 per cent; bicarbonate of potash, 17 per cent; oxide of lead, 50 per cent; borax, 4 per cent, and a trace of arsenic. Carefully prepared by competent hands, this mixture produces a grade of glass which in brilliancy and iridescence yields little to the genuine diamond itself, and these qualities may be fur-ther enhanced by the substitution of potassium for the bicarbonate of potash and an increase of the quantity of

oxide of lead used.
Stones carefully made by this process can only be distinguished from the genuine by experts. This is true, how-ever, only so long as they are new, for imitation gems wear off, become blind and lose their fire with age, and it is to remedy these defects that the efforts of the chemists are now directed. Opaque gems, like the turquoise and the opal, are made from glass whose transparency is destroyed by the addition of exide of zinc after pulverization. The color of the turquoise is produced by means of oxide of copper and cobalt.
