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A SPIDER'S BITE!

Fatal to Henry W. Rausch, of Baltimore---The Man

Died in Great Agony.

Baltimore, Md., July 2.—Henry W. Rausch, a laborer, 61 years old, died today from the bite of a spider. His face and neck were swollen beyond recognition.

Rausch was seated on his doorstep last Monday when he left something crawling on his neck. He endeavored to brush it off, but the insect clung to the flesh. He then grasped it, and at the same time felt it had stung him. It was a small black spider, and he thought nothing of the incident until yesterday, when severe pains in the neck and face induced him to consult a physician. He died in great agony.

RELIEF FROM TORRID HEAT!

Welcome Rain Storms Temper the Killing Heat in New York.

Total Deaths in the City for Six Days Estimated at 600---Rising Temperature Follows the Storm---Harvesting by Moonlight to Avoid the Heat.

New York, July 3.—(Midnight).—Rain storms of today with their consequent fall in temperature were a Godsend to the bulk of sweltering humanity in this city. As soon as the last storm of the afternoon had passed over the temperature immediately began to ascend again. The wind, which blew during the storm, also commenced to abate very rapidly until it assumed the proportions of a slight breeze only. The sea atmosphere conditions, coupled with the very considerable humidity which came as an aftermath of the downpour of water from the clouds, made the suffering almost as intense as it was when the thermometer had registered several degrees higher.

The long stretch of exceeding great heat had reduced everybody to the verge of collapse, and there was no cessation in the work devolving on the ambulances.

HOSPITALS CROWDED.

Most of the hospitals are already crowded to their utmost capacity, and many of them have erected tents on their grounds for the accommodation of heat victims. The death rate has increased with such rapidity that the morgue is being taxed as it never was before.

When the first downpour of rain struck the city today it was accompanied by thunder and a fair speed gale, which soon reduced the temperature 15 degrees. The humidity made the air so sultry, however, that the great reduction was not perceptible to the extent which most people would imagine.

THE FALL IN TEMPERATURE.

At 12:30 p.m. the temperature registered 24 degrees, and half an hour later it had dropped 2 degrees. Then it continued to fall as the rain poured, and at 3 p.m. it registered only 16 degrees. By 4 o'clock, however, a rise of four degrees was noted. An hour later the temperature dropped again, and at 5 p.m. it was 17 degrees; at 6 o'clock 18, and at 7 p.m., 19.

DAMAGE DONE BY WIND.

The wind and lightning which accompanied the rain did considerable damage in the city, especially out toward Harlem. Many trees, awnings and buildings were injured, but up to 10 o'clock no human casualties had been reported.

WEDNESDAY'S FATALITIES.

There were 89 deaths and 107 cases of heat prostrations in the boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx during the hours between 2 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. today.

A rainfall in Brooklyn this afternoon brought some relief to the thousands of heat victims, but it was not enough to stop the advance in deaths, due to heat. Since June 23, when the hot wave came, up to 1 p.m. today there were 150 fatal heat cases reported.

Five hundred employees of the street cleaning department are reported ill from the effects of the hot weather, and almost the entire 500 men employed at the navy yard stopped work in less than an hour after they started this morning.

600 DEATHS FROM HEAT.

New York, July 4.—At 12:30 o'clock this (Thursday) morning it is estimated that the total number of deaths in the last six days has been 600.

In the boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx this (Thursday) morning the total number of deaths from the heat were 99, prostrations 167.

HARVESTING BY MOONLIGHT.

Topeka, Kan., July 4.—Hundreds of harvesting machines are running at night throughout the great wheat belt. The heat is so intense that harvesting by moonlight was adopted for comfort.

NO SUNSTROKES THERE.

Ottawa, July 3.—A telegram from John Myrick, the keeper of the government lighthouse at Cape Race, says the steamer Sapra reports that the Straits of Belle Isle are completely blocked with ice.

FETTERED THE MINISTERS

Entertained

By Canadian Residents in Old London—

The Earls of Aberdeen and Derby

Among the Guests.

London, July 4.—The Canadian residents of London gave a luncheon at the Constitutional Club on Tuesday to the members of the Dominion ministry now in the city, to enable them to meet distinguished visitors from other British colonies. The guests of honor were: Sir Louis Davies, minister of marine; Hon. A. G. Blair, minister of railways and canals; Hon. W. S. Fielding, minister of finance; Hon. S. A. Fisher, minister of agriculture, and Hon. David Mills, minister of justice.

Among the others present were the Earl of Derby and Sir Barrett-Coutts, Sir Louis Davies, in his speech at the Dominion Day banquet, said: "Reciprocity of action is such that there is no distrust, fear or danger between the colonies and the empire today. Our only fear is the fear of the future. We are as proud of both as you are."

"The Canada of today is not the Canada of 1867. There was a time when certain people thought Canada could be forced into relations with the United States, but time, thank God, has gone by, and the time to talk annexation has passed by."

"Today our faith is pinned to the flag, and our material prosperity lies that way. We recognized the cause in South Africa was a righteous cause."

The Earls of Derby and Aberdeen also spoke.

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
