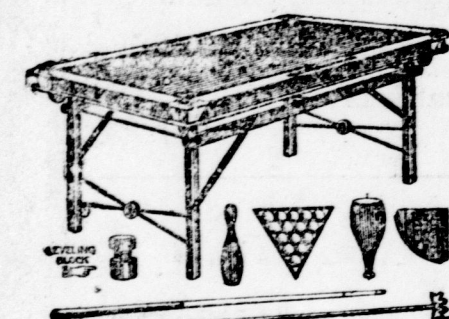

TREES ARE NOT TO BE CUT LEFT \$2,000 TO CHURCH

Must Not Be Removed Unless Residents Give Permission.

Wellington Street Methodists Benefit Under Will.

This Is Rule of Tree Committee and Should Be Followed.

Mrs. Holywell Leaves Several Sums to Charities.

It has been reported to the city engineer's department that in at least one instance a man had attempted to cut down a tree in front of a citizen's residence in spite of the protests of his wife, who happened to be at home.

While the work of the tree officers is a good one, and will be productive of a decided improvement in the appearance of the streets, which will be more noticeable each succeeding year, and while the city has the right to order trees taken out where necessary, the officials have all along been emphatic in the stand that even where there is no doubt that the trees should be cut, absolutely nothing should be done that would be contrary to the desires of the resident at the location concerned.

The notice which is left at the houses where trees are marked is explicit as to that point, and states that the trees which have been marked will not be taken down without the sanction of the resident, and doubt can only arise in a case, as the one mentioned, where no trees were marked, and consequently no notice left.

The committee who are engaged in the marking would be obliged if a greater number of persons who think they have some trees which should be taken out would send in their addresses, as such action will make their work considerably easier than at present.

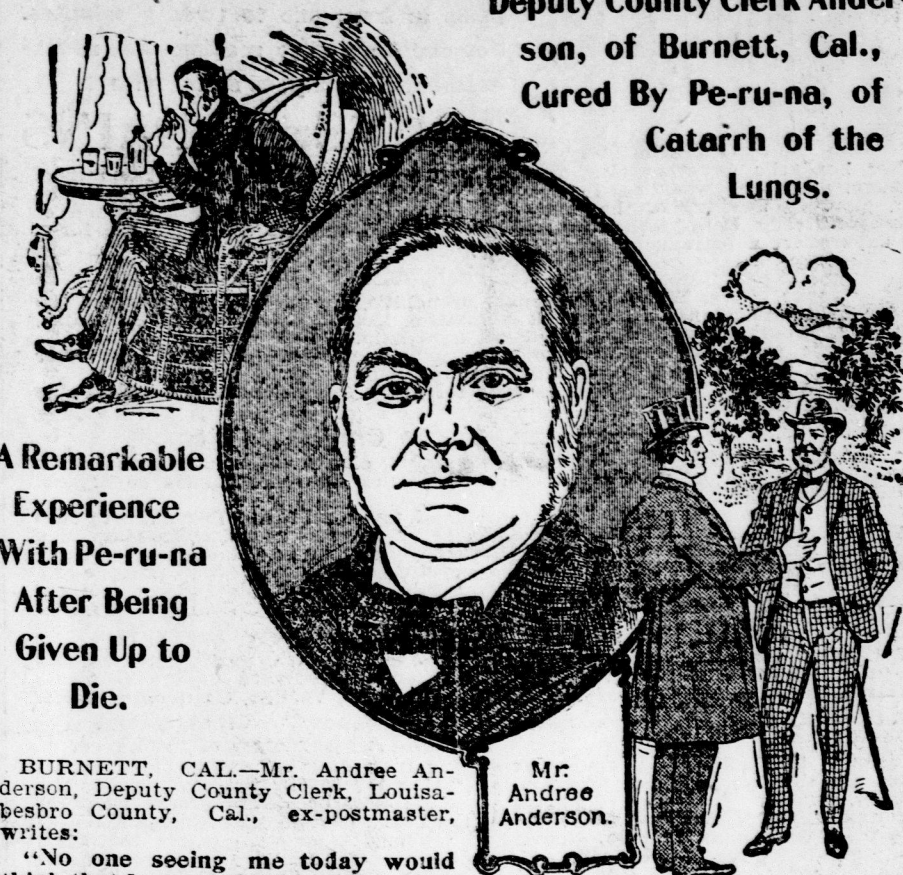
