Some of the glory of Ed. Siever's famous victory was taken off from him when the Chicago papers referred to him as "the young Canadian twister." If there is anything that makes the southpaw sore it is to be called a Canadian. He was born in Illinois, and never lived in Canada except when he was pitching for the London, Ont., team of the International League, just before he came to this city—Detroit Tribune.

And is it, then, such a disgrace to be called a countryman of Lajoie, the acknowledged king of the diamond? Is it possible that it brings the blush of shame to Mr. Siever's classic brow to be mistaken for a countryman of Ned Hanlon, Jake Gaudaur and George Orton? It is to be feared that Mr. Siever has earned the name given him by the fans; in Texas they still believe Montreal is a fur-trading post on Hudson's Bay.

One of the advantages of having a veteran catcher on the staff was shown in Thursday's game, when McGuire was receiver for Siever, says the Detroit Free Press. Chicago batsmen became desperate as inning after inning rolled by without a hit, and studied the pitching closely, in the hope of finding the weak spot. Tom Daly thought he had it solved when he went up to bat in the eighth inning. He had watched the break of the ball closely, and when he reached the plate he took a place up towards the front of the box, figuring to gauge the curve ball just right. McGuire observed the change of position and signaled a starting pitcher to the couple of fast, straight ones. Daly thought they were going wide, for called balls, and let both go by, with the result that there were two strikes on him before he realized it.

The Chicago papers are loud in their praise of Siever, and give him due credit for his brilliant work in last Thursday's game. The Tribune says: "No such remarkable exhibition of pitching has been seen this early in any season as that presented by the left-handed young Canadian who faced the two-time champions and made them forget they had a pitcher before them. That is the total of the exciting performance by Mr. Siever in the face of a team of veterans, many of whom have faced the best twirling in the country and solved it."

BASEBALL. A PERPETUAL INJUNCTION AGAINST LAJOIE. Philadelphia, April 29.—The court of the city of Philadelphia has granted a perpetual injunction against Second Baseman Lajoie and Pitchers Bernhard and Frazer, restraining them from playing with any baseball club other than the Philadelphia National League Club.

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FREEDMAN-SPALDING WAR OVER

The legal war between Andrew Freedman and Albert G. Spalding for the control of the National League and baseball clubs was brought to an end yesterday, when, by consent of all the parties, Justice Gieseler, in the supreme court, made an order permitting Spalding to file an answer. It was stated at the time that an appeal from Justice Truax's decision would be taken to the appellate division, but no further steps were taken by the Spalding faction. The consent to the discontinuance of the suit was signed by all the lawyers engaged in the litigation.
