TREKKING TO THE SIBERIAN WILDS

Thousands of Settlers From Old Russia Pouring Into the Fertile Districts.

Toronto, Nov. 3.—Details of a great trek from old Russia to the fertile steppes of Southern and Western Siberia were furnished The Province recently by Mr. C. J. Keigly, an Englishman, who, with his family and a Russian friend, Mr. K. Ouslanoff, are guests at the St. Francis Hotel. Mr. Keigly has resided in the Asiatic possessions of the Czar for nearly twelve years, and came here in order to place his children in school, as there are no facilities for educating them in his home among the steppes of Southern Siberia. He expects to return there at a later date.

"I have resided in many provinces of Siberia," he said, "and recent years I have been engaged in the export butter trade in the western region, at a point north of the Altai Mountains, and five hundred miles south of the railway, the butter being shipped to London. It reaches the railway by steamer down the Irish River in summer, and in winter is hauled to Omsk in sleds. The city where I dwell is situated in the steppe or prairie district. Grain there sells at about half the price realized by the Western Canadian farmer, but is destined to be a factor in the English markets as soon as improved transportation facilities are provided.

Don't Settle on Farms.

"Settlers from old Russia are pouring into the fertile districts of Siberia at a phenomenal rate, the number easily reaching several hundred thousands annually. I think the movement of population in that direction is even greater than the influx to your own Northwest. This spring the facilities of the Siberian Railway will be taxed to the utmost in handling the crowds of incoming settlers. Unfortunately the Russian Government does not aid or direct the work, and hence many people go to regions where conditions obtain the reverse of those in the homes they have left.

"Many districts in the southwestern and western districts are already settled. Fruit growing is a success, as irrigation methods are in vogue. The Russians make mistakes in colonizing. They live in village communities, and drive out every morning to their fields, camping if the stay is prolonged. But a holiday or a feast brings them back to the village. They have not adapted the Anglo-Saxon idea of settling and living in houses on their own farms. A lot of time is wasted by trekking to and from the farms. Many of the settlers in the southern regions are Germans, the descendants of the German mercenaries who engaged in the service of the Empress Catherine the Great, over 160 years ago.

Minefields of All Kinds.

"Siberia abounds in minerals of all kinds as well as coal, and offers more opportunities today to foreign capital than any other portion of the world. There are numerous new copper mines, some of which are controlled by English capital. In the central district 25 dredges are extracting a great deal of gold, and this is only one of many rich localities. The Russian mining laws in Siberia are liberal, and foreigners are allowed to take out licenses and operate or buy claims. This privilege applies all over Siberia, except in the regions adjacent to the Pacific Ocean, where will be the scene of the next mining boom. The administration is very liberal, and in marked contrast to conditions in old Russia. I would advise mining men to visit Siberia if they desire to embrace golden opportunities."

CHINESE PRINCESS DEAD

Sister of the Empress Passes Away in a Mysterious Manner.

Peking, Nov. 3.—Japan today began intrusting the transportation of the Japanese mails to the care of the posts which is on outcome of China's coercive action in refusing Japan the use of the imperial railways for her mail couriers. China's action was induced by Japan's postal aggressions, her independent postoffice service in China having been troubled in two years, and also to France's attempted re-establishment of couriers from Yunnan, where the Indo-China post has been operated since 1901. It is uncertain if France will withdraw her Indo-China post couriers, who have been operating since a fortnight ago.

Seventy stations north of Kuan Cheng Tsu have been added to the China telegraph system as a result of the Russo-Chinese telegraph convention. Although the douganger empress was reported on Oct. 13 to be ill the entire court returned from the summer palace to the forbidden city last night for the winter. Grand councilors, Yuan Shih Kai and Chang Chih Lung, are following the court. About 11,000 troops recently brought from Peking by garrisoned the twelve miles intervening between the summer palace and Peking. Considerable mystery surrounds the death three weeks ago of the Princess Shun, the empress's sister, on account of the reserve maintained regarding women. As the princess was a favorite of the ladies here many of the latter desired to console with the court, but the officials were unable the passing away of the princess.

JEWELS FOR KING STOLEN IN TRAIN

Parcel of Diamonds Valued at \$1,000, Destined for Siam's King Taken.

London, Nov. 3.—R. F. Mosley, a partner in the Alexander Clark Manufacturing Company, a wholesale jewelry firm, of Fenchurch and Oxford streets, has been robbed, while traveling from Rome to Naples, of a parcel of diamonds valued at \$1,000, destined for the King of Siam.

The thieves also took \$350 worth of English and foreign notes, but overlooked other parcels of jewelry valued at \$50,000, which Mr. Mosley had with him.

Mr. Mosley, who returned to London on Monday morning, gave the following account of the robbery last night: "Our firm has done a large business with the King of Siam, both here and in his own country," he said.

"On Friday, Oct. 4, I took a return ticket from London to Rome, in order to take a special selection of the finest jewelry for the King of Siam's inspection. I left Charing Cross by the 2:20, traveling by the wagon-lit from Paris to Rome. On my arrival I found he had left an hour before for Naples. I started from Rome to Naples at 12:05 on Sunday night, traveling again in a wagon-lit.

"I asked for a bottle of soda water soon after starting, and as I had no small change, pulled out a bundle of notes—\$25 English and \$100 Italian and French. The attendant gave change for one of the notes, and I put the others back in the inside pocket of my coat, where I had also \$1,000 worth of loose diamonds.

"Before going to sleep I hung up my coat, waistcoat, and trousers on a hook. The thieves, who had evidently seen me put away the notes, stole the coat and waistcoat during the night, but, fortunately, did not touch the trousers. In the hip pocket of which were \$50,000 worth of loose jewels, mostly diamonds and emeralds. In my suitcase I had from \$6,000 to \$40,000 worth of mounted gems.

"Immediately on reaching Naples I reported the robbery to the police, who have already arrested one of the attendants on the train on suspicion. They informed me that, owing to the peculiar variety of the stolen diamonds, they have great hopes of recovering them.

"I also lost my gold cigarette case and my return ticket from Naples to Rome.

"Since arriving in London I have been told that all my movements have been watched by a gang of international thieves since I went to Berlin with parcels of jewels for the King of Siam."

MUSIC FOR HORSES

Regimental Steeds Like Sweet Sounds Especially After Their Oats.

Berlin, Nov. 3.—Regimental horses have been the subjects of musical tests and nearly all enjoyed the experience, only a very small percentage of the animals remaining indifferent to sweet sounds. The equally few showed active dislike. The great majority were soothed, inspired, or excited by music.

Most of the horses, like the war chargers one may suppose them to be, enjoyed the bugle above any other instrument and neighed gallantly when it was sounded, but thoroughbreds and colts generally were found to prefer the shrill treble of the fife, which roused them to great and sometimes to unmanageable enthusiasm. This was the more significant because the fife was an unfamiliar instrument to them, not being generally used as the bugle in the French army.

Finally all the musical horses particularly appreciated sweet sounds after a meal of oats and before breakfast they showed restiveness when played to.

General James H. Baker of Mankato, Minn., who was commissioned by the states under President Grant, has been visiting Washington for the first time in many years and has been entertained by a number of old veterans whose pension certificates he signed nearly 40 years ago.

Paris, Nov. 3.—Examinations for admission to the Paris Conservatoire are now proceeding. The jury of admission have decided this year upon the merits of more than three hundred candidates each of whom is convinced that he or she possesses talent equaling that of Mme. Bernhardt or M. Coquelin.

A young woman who failed to pass the examination last year had a scene specially written for her by a minor poet, wherein imprecations were heaped upon each member of the obnoxious jury.

That the pranks played by French students are not so much unlike those of Americans is shown by an incident at the Conservatoire. The unusual feature, however, is the fact that the parents looked on smilingly at the young couple. A crowd of candidates for the regulation courses assembled in the court outside the examination-room when twenty youths started a newspaper bonfire around which they dealt a war dance. Deaf to all remonstrances, the youngsters continued their pranks and kept on adding to the bonfire until it was necessary to summon a squad of police.
