VERDICT OF \$2,500

for Murder at Spring Assizes.

PRISONER WIDE AWAKE THE DEFENCE IS FLIMSY

Seems to Have Come Out of His Apathetic Mood of Few Weeks Ago.

The grand jury at noon today brought in a true bill of indictment for murder against Daniel Reynolds for the death of Frederick Culver on the night of Dec. 14 last, and the ac cused was arraigned for trial. Crown Attorney McGregor Young, of Toronto, asked that the case be laid over for the spring assizes, which commence on Feb. 26, on the ground that it would be in the interests of justice owing to the absence of a material witness

Mr. P. H. Bartlett, counsel for the defence, stated that he had not asked for a postponement, although it would be agreeable to the defence. When Reynolds was brought into

the court he appeared to have lost all the apathy which he exhibited on previous occasions. He looked well, and seemed bright and attentive, and looked about the court room in an interested and wide-awake way. He was neatly and carefully dressed. Pleads Not Guilty.

He pleaded not guilty, and expressed himself as ready for his trial. When he was being led out of the prisoner's box to be taken back to the cells his wife arose from a seat in the audience just to the rear of the box and called him by name.

Not attracting his attention she followed her husband and the constables to the door of the court room, where she reached out her hand and after kissing him, said good-bye. Then she back across the room and out of the opposite door frightened and evidently agitated manner. Reynolds did not seem as in-

Daniel Reynolds Will Be Tried Brakeman Who Lost His Leg at Ayr Receives Favorable Verdict.

Employees Unable to Refute Story Told by Victim of Accident. Last July.

The case of John J. O'Rourke vs the C. P. R., was decided in favor of the plaintiff this morning, a verdict of \$2,500 being awarded. The case occupied the attention of the high court session yesterday afternoon. John J. O'Rourke, a brakeman, while uncoupling a car at Ayr, Ont., last July, had one leg run over and severed. O'Rourke stated in court that he had signalled for the train to be held, but that while

under the car it started unexpectedly The plaintiff alleged that it was due to the negligence of the company or the company's servants that the accident occurred.

Claims of Defense.

The argument for the defence was that the engineer had no knowledge whatever that O'Rourke was under the train, and that the train was not started by the engineer.

S. H. Chesney, the engineer, admitted that if the train started accidentally, he must have been mistaken. in his judgment of what brakes were required to hold it. He had not started it himself, and the brakes usually applied to hold a train on a grade of similar altitude had been applied.

Toronto, Ont., Jan. 10 .- Chief Jusice Falconbridge has dismissed the actions brought by A. N. Warfield, engineer, of London, Ont., against W. A. Bugg, N. R. Bugg, and the Central Securities Company, and against the People's Railway Company.


