### DOGS MUST BE KEPT OFF ST. THOMAS STREETS

Government Inspectors Order Rigid Quarantine in Rabies Scare—No New Cases.

[Special to The Advertiser.] St. Thomas, Jan. 28.—Dr. J. H. Tennent, of London, and Dr. George Hill, of Ottawa, were here yesterday in connection with the rabies scare. No new cases have been reported, but the officers took steps to see that a rigid quarantine is observed. A bylaw will be passed at the next meeting of the council to prohibit dogs from running at large.

Dr. Tennent was asked to enforce the Dominion quarantine against the suspected dogs, and this quarantine means that these dogs are to be isolated as directed by an inspector, and any infringement means a fine of \$100 for the first offence and \$200 for the second offence. The city authorities are having much opposition to the plan for enforcing these regulations by an over-zealous humane society and certain dog fanciers who do not wish to have their dogs destroyed, although these have been bitten in some cases.

Another dog, a fox terrier which was acting queerly on the market yesterday morning, and snapped at a policeman, was promptly dispatched by being struck on the head by the officer's baton.

### WILL ASK SUBSIDY FOR NORTHERN RAILWAY

Kincardine, Owen Sound and Other Places Will Send Delegations to Ontario

[Special to The Advertiser.] Kincardine, Jan. 27.—The local council will have a busy time during the coming season. Yesterday Mayor Robert Patterson received a request from the mayor of Owen Sound to have a deputation appointed to go to Ottawa with deputations from Owen Sound and each of the corporations between Orillia and Kincardine, to ask the Government to give a subsidy to the projected electric railroad, which has been chartered to run from Orillia to Owen Sound, and from thence to Southampton and here, meeting the West Shore Electric Railroad now partly built between Goderich and Kincardine.

It is probable that a representative delegation will be sent. If, as is likely, the electric railroad will be extended from Goderich to Sarnia, there will be opened up some of the finest territory in Western Ontario. A level farming tract of country which will be transformed into beautiful orchards lying within the fruit belt and long known as the "Garden of Canada."

Bordering Lake Huron and within easy access of the thousands of islands in the Georgian Bay, the road would be convenient also to many of the cities of the United States.

And those interested in the project are certain that an enormous summer business would be done.

### INQUEST ORDERED INTO GUELPH DEATH

Manuel Downey, Furnaceman, Was Found Lying Dead on Floor in Bathroom.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Guelph, Jan. 28.—Manuel Downey, aged 25, was found lying dead on the floor of the bathroom at the home of Charles Watson last evening. Mr. Watson and family are in the south, and Downey had been looking after the furnace.

The only occupant of the house was Mr. Arthur Watson, a brother, and he only slept there. He came to the house in the afternoon and found the bathroom door locked, but as the mother and sister of deceased sometimes came to the house to tidy it up, he concluded the room was occupied by one of them and went away. He returned at 8 o'clock in the evening and found the door still locked. He broke it open and found young Downey lying dead and almost naked on the floor. He immediately called the police and a coroner's inquest was held.

Mr. Downey at once notified a physician living opposite, who in turn called in Coroner Dr. McLean, and an inquest was ordered. The jury met, viewed the body, and adjourned to meet Monday morning at 9:30. In the meantime a post-mortem examination is being made.

## NAVY NO GOOD SAYS BERESFORD

In Book Launches Terrific Attack on Admiralty Board's Policy.

### TOO MUCH PARSIMONY

Holds That Failure to Build Docks for Dreadnoughts Is a Betrayal of Trust.

London, Jan. 29.—Admiral Lord Charles Beresford's (retired) book on the British naval policy since 1902, which has been looked forward to with great interest and the publication of which was suspended on the eve of its issue a few months ago, is out today.

The suspension of the publication is explained by Lord Charles, who says that as the book was about to be published the first lord of the admiralty was removed and the board of admiralty was reconstituted. Now that the war board has been formed he does not see any reason for further delaying the publication of the book.

The title of the book, "The Betrayal," is the keynote of the text, though the revision it has undergone since its withdrawal last November has probably taken out much of the sting. The withdrawal was due to the retirement of Reginald McKenna as first lord of the admiralty, against whom the indictments of Lord Charles are mainly directed.

The establishment of the war office by Winston Churchill, the new first lord of the admiralty, settled one of Lord Charles' most urgent demands, but nevertheless the book as issued contains a trenchant attack on the British naval policy of the last ten years, the evils of which, the author says, have gone deep and will take a long time to cure.

Denounces Scheme. Lord Charles denounces the scheme for the education of officers as utterly impracticable. It does not, he says, give the navy skilled engineers, while the system of cramming examinations he considers useless and injurious.

Another grave failure of the naval policy, in the opinion of Lord Charles, is the policy in regard to cruisers and torpedo-boat destroyers. Eighty of these vessels, he says, went to scrap heap in 1909, and have not been replaced. The result of this was that these classes in 1909 fell from 45 to 30, respectively, while similar classes in Germany rose at the same time from 30 to 40.

The refusal of the admiralty to construct docks for the biggest battleships is denounced by Lord Charles as a betrayal of public trust. Germany, he says, has built big docks concurrently with her battleships, but even now the vessels of Great Britain are being left to take chances in case of emergency.

The denouement of the great trade routes of protecting cruisers, and the weakening of the defences of the Mediterranean through parsimony, come under the lash of the author. The whip descends also on the admiralty's apparent idea that it was building a Dreadnought that would outclass the latest of the German fleet. He has gradually appeared that the American, Japanese and German battleships are actually superior to the Dreadnought in fighting qualities.

Lord Charles is particularly severe on the admiralty's admission in 1909 that it had under-estimated Germany's and over-estimated Great Britain's building capacity. He declares that the admiralty was aware of this fact long before that time, but had suppressed the knowledge.

Lord Charles searchingly criticizes the famous admiralty memorandum dealing with a possible invasion by Germany and the provision against such an attack, and alleges that there were grave deficiencies in the coal reserves, supply of stores and docks, and as well as the personnel.

Lord Charles concludes by making the general deduction that, while individual officers were never more efficient, the fleet as a whole, considering the increased responsibilities, has seldom been less adequate.

### RESUMES PRACTICE

Dr. Macgregor Returns to Practice of His Profession at Uxby, Mich.

Uxby, Mich., Jan. 28.—Dr. Robert Macgregor, formerly of London, Ont., who has been released on bail in connection with the Sparling poisoning case, has resumed his practice here, and the fact that the public generally believe in his innocence is shown by an increased number of patients.

## SEES ROOSEVELT IN WHITE HOUSE

Gov. Stubbs, of Kansas, Sure He Will Be the Next President.

### CERTAIN OF NOMINATION

Declares the Colonel Cannot Refuse To Accept Genuine Demand From The Nation.

New York, Jan. 27.—Theodore Roosevelt is not a candidate for the presidency, but nevertheless will be nominated and elected, according to a statement issued tonight by Governor Stubbs, of Kansas, who lunched with the former president today at Oyster Bay. Governor Stubbs is the second governor within 24 hours to say that he is going back home to work for Roosevelt.

"There is no doubt whatever that Col. Theodore Roosevelt will be nominated by the Republican convention in Chicago and elected the next president of the United States," said Governor Stubbs' statement. "I say this, knowing from his personal statements to me, repeated during a personal conversation today, that he is not a candidate and will not be a candidate for the nomination. I am fully convinced he means exactly what he says and that he honestly and sincerely feels that he personally has nothing to gain by another term as president."

"But Col. Roosevelt never has said to me nor to any living human being that he would refuse the nomination if it came to him as the result of a genuine demand on the part of the American people."

"There is such a demand at this time. At the information I have been able to gather from all parts of the country indicates that that demand will persist, and grow and force the convention to offer him the nomination. His noble spirit, his courage, and his keen sense of the duties and obligations of a citizen will forbid him to set his back against a task which the people demand he perform."

### WANT CLEARER CASE FROM THE DOMINION

Comment of Australian Premier On the Proposal For Reciprocal Trade.

Melbourne, Jan. 28.—The Australian prime minister, Hon. Andrew Fisher, and he says, has built big docks concurrently with her battleships, but even now the vessels of Great Britain are being left to take chances in case of emergency.

### SLAYER OF PAPPAS CAUGHT AT LITTLE CITY

Man Wanted in Connection With Soo Murder Arrested Without a Struggle.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Jan. 28.—Giuseppe Nardoni, the man who shot Mike Pappas here a week ago today, was arrested by Chief of Police Vincent, near Little City, at 8:30 o'clock last night. Vincent had been in the city endeavoring to secure information re Nardoni, and was returning downtown, when he noticed the man approaching him in an apparently nervous condition. Vincent stopped the man and said: "Is that you, Joe?" and the man replied, "Nardoni." Vincent suggested that the man had better go along with him and Nardoni replied, "All right, but don't hurt me." He was taken to the district jail and locked up. The police have not yet been able to find out from the man where he has been in hiding since the past week, but it would seem that he had suffered to a certain extent and was in need of nourishment. During the past few days the authorities have impressed upon Nardoni the nature of the crime of harboring a murderer and it is believed that the parties who had him

### CLEVELAND SOCIALISTS TO BEAR TAFT

Will Demand From President Jobs For Unemployed of the Country.

Cleveland, Jan. 28.—As a result of a meeting of unemployed in the public square today, a committee of Socialists will attempt to force an interview with President Taft during his visit here tomorrow, to demand that the Government take steps to furnish work for those without jobs throughout the country.

If this fails, resolutions, unanimously adopted, provide for the formation of a second Coxey's army to descend on Washington.

It was also decided to march on the city council tomorrow night, 10,000 strong, and demand that the city furnish immediate employment. If the demand is not met, the plan is to seize a grocery store somewhere in the business section and distribute its proceeds.

The meeting was enlivened by several impassioned addresses, and by a fist fight between two women, one of whom was knocked flat by her opponent.

The meeting attracted a huge crowd, several policemen being interested spectators.

**THINKS BOY SCOUTS DANGEROUS TO UNIONS**  
The Movement Comes Under the Ban of United Mine Workers.  
[Canadian Press.] Indianapolis, Ind., Jan. 27.—The Boy Scout movement came under the ban of the United Mine Workers of America, along with the Civic Federation today when the miners' convention adopted an amendment to the constitution providing that no one connected with the Boy Scouts shall be permitted to be a member of the miners' union.

The section of the constitution refusing membership in the union to persons connected with the Civic Federation will be adopted with little opposition. James Herrin, of Sparta, Ill., who proposed the Boy Scout amendment, declared the movement was detrimental to unionism and would "grow into an organization of strikebreakers."

**WALKER RUN DOWN.**  
Saratoga, Jan. 27.—On the last lap of a 136-mile walk to see friends in this city, Thos. Gillespie, of Corning, N. Y., long distance walker, was run down by a railroad engine near Dunmore last night. He died shortly after.
