CHARGES BROTHER OF JAIL SUICIDE

August Hammer Says Last Note of Relative Is Proof to Him of Innocence.

CLAIMS HIS REMAINS FOR DECENT BURIAL

Appeal for Help Did Not Reach Brother Until It Was Too Late.

Has Faith in Last Message. He carried the note left by his brother, teclaring his innocence, and August Hammer pinned his faith to that last message.

Mr. Hammer, speaking with quite a German accent, pointed to the note when asked his opinion by The Advertiser, "If he had been tried in Berlin, where he was known, this would never have happened. The letters to me, asking for assistance before the trial, were directed to my sister at Berlin. At the time I had left Berlin and was working with a farmer in the country. Later, I went on to Hamilton. My sister did not have any idea what the messages were, and forwarded them to me unopened. Although written three weeks ago, they only reached me yesterday. He had no friends here to look after him, or this would never have occurred.
