NON-CONFORMISTS ENEMY OF CHURCH IN OLD COUNTRY

Seeking to Destroy Establishment, Says Speaker at Alumni Banquet.

Many Clergymen Formerly Identified With College Spend Enjoyable Evening.

The Huron College Alumni Association held its annual banquet Monday evening in the dining-room at Huron College. A large number of clergymen who were formerly associated with the college were present at the gathering, which proved a most enjoyable one. Rev. W. H. Snelgrove presided.

A toast, "The College as a Power for the Church in the Diocese," was responded to by Rev. Merton Shore and Rev. Canon Craig.

Each reviewed the past history of the college, and instances many of the brilliant men who had graduated from its walls during the past half century. These had done an immense work in the church, and the high standard of work which they had set would doubtless be fully maintained in the years to come.

"Unity and Loyalty" among the Alumni was a toast that brought an interesting response from Rev. A. L. G. Clarke and Rev. A. L. Beverly. There was need of unity and cooperation among the graduates of a college if the highest good was to be obtained. They should be loyal and helpful to each other in every way, and in this respect it was thought that there was still room for improvement among the graduates of Western University. A project to establish a college in German East Africa for the training of missionaries for that field was outlined to the members present. Rev. T. B. R. Westgate, who is a missionary in that region, asked through his brother that support be given the project, and that the plan, and funds will likely be raised through the country organizations.

Fare Week Meeting. Some discussion took place as to the advisability of holding a meeting during fair week. The majority of the members were in favor, and arrangements will be made by the incoming executive. The officers elected for the coming year were as follows: President, Rev. T. B. Howard; 1st vice-president, Rev. A. A. Hoot; 2nd vice-president, Rev. T. Dobson; secretary, Rev. H. P. Westgate; treasurer, Rev. A. Shore; executive committee, Rev. A. L. G. Clarke, E. Appleyard, A. B. Farney, W. H. Roberts, H. C. Light and A. McKeech; representative to the senate of Western University, Rev. T. B. Howard.

The members later adjourned to the lecture-room, where a most able paper dealing with the "Contrast Between the Church in England and the Church in Canada," was read by Rev. F. H. Brown, of Woodstock.

The Englishman, and perhaps more particularly the Englishwoman, coming to Canada noticed many differences in the usages of the church of this country. They have been taught to believe that the organizations of the church are imperial in their scope, and yet when they come to Canada they do not find many of the organizations to which they have been accustomed. The Brotherhood of St. Andrew took the place of the Church of England Society, the Boy Scouts replace the Church Lads' Brigade. Young men find that instead of the Girls' Friendly Society there is the Daughters of the King, and in many districts the mothers' and daughters' club, a serious loss, as in the old land the Mothers' Club was the only thing that bound thousands of women to the church. It was their one aid to a better life.

The Englishman, he said, is shy and conservative, and when he finds that he is not as well looked after here as in the old country he is at a disadvantage.

Roman Church an Ally. The ecclesiastical atmosphere of Canada is also different. In England the Nonconformists were the enemy of the church in seeking to destroy its establishment, and while the difference between Catholic and Roman Catholic was very clearly taught, the Roman Church was always loved upon as an ally. Here the Roman Church was regarded as the enemy, and the newcomer learns, by hearsay, that there are just two bodies in Canada, Catholic and Protestant, and that they divided into many sections, each as good as the other.

The aids to a spiritual life were not nearly so numerous in this country as in the old. Retired clergymen were seldom heard of here, and this was a loss which the old country clergymen coming out here feel keenly. The annual synod meetings, helpful as they were, became somewhat of a nuisance, and on which "we are washed in floods of eloquence, and dried in a long engender of practical business."

He touched on the problem of religious instruction in the public schools, and stated that while there were difficulties in introducing it into the schools of Canada, the problems which would later crop up from the want of it would be infinitely greater.

Several clergymen present supplemented the speaker's remarks in a short discussion which followed.

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FINANCE REPORT OF HURON DIOCESE READY FOR SYNOD

Receipts for Regular Purposes Total Nearly Fourteen Thousand Dollars.

Executive Disposes of a Large Amount of Important Business.

The Synod executive committee met Monday afternoon in the committee room at St. Paul's Cathedral, the Lordship of the Bishop of Huron presiding. Its meeting on the eve of the opening of Synod is always a most important one, as the committee is vested with considerable power and occupies a large place in the affairs of the diocese. The session Monday afternoon was no exception to the rule, and a vast amount of important business was disposed of. The financial report, which was adopted and which will be presented to the Synod today, showed receipts for regular diocesan purposes and objects of \$13,628.28, this being but \$57.41 less than last year, which was a record. A total of \$43,612.49 was received for all purposes.

The contributions for Huron College, not taking into account the jubilee subscriptions, amounted to \$1,374.08, an increase of \$140.94, the largest on record for any single year. This was particularly gratifying to the committee in view of the prominence which Huron College affairs are likely to have in this present synod.

The receipts for other than diocesan purposes were \$19,478.70, as compared with \$20,290.38 last year, but in this latter amount were included a \$500 legacy and more than \$2,000, which had been contributed for the China famine fund. It is customary each year to make an apportionment of funds for the coming year, a sort of budget. Last year the synod was asked for \$18,183.13. Of this amount they received \$13,668.28, or about 75 per cent, a proportion similar to that of last year.

Missions have always been kept well in the front in the Diocese of Huron, as the following statement of collections for other than diocesan purposes shows:

This was an increase of \$234.80 over the collections of the previous year. From the jubilee fund the sum of \$5,336.72, including \$409.13, transferred to the Indian mission stipend account, has been paid in grants to those entitled to them under the terms of the jubilee. The sum of \$116.34 still remains to the credit of the account. The sum of \$400 was also paid as outfit grants under the jubilee.

The sum of \$7,614.25 has been paid during the past year in pensions to the widows and orphans of deceased clergy.

A sum of \$820.00 was transferred from the general purposes fund, being the full amount authorized by the canon, and \$1,077.23 from the diocesan purposes fund to balance the account. One widow has been removed by death, and two have been placed upon the fund. Thirty-three widows and nine children are now (April 30) sharing in the benefits of this fund.

In accordance with the resolution of last synod, the sum of \$2,308.29 has been added to capital from the general purposes fund, and \$62.80 from private gifts, and now amounts to \$7,138.47. The income from investments has been sufficient to pay 6 per cent. on the capital to all beneficiaries, and there remains a balance of \$1,387.35 to be distributed with the 10 per cent. reserved to those entitled thereto on Aug. 1 next, and it is hoped that the same rate

of 6 per cent. can be paid for the year ending April 30, 1914.

This is the financial report which was laid before the executive committee yesterday afternoon and considered in detail. Judge Robb moved that Archdeacon Young, the secretary-treasurer, be granted an increase of salary and that an assistant be appointed. An amendment to this was moved by Mr. Matthew Wilson, and seconded by Canon Hicks, of Simcoe, that this matter be referred to the synod with a recommendation that the services of Archdeacon Young be suitably recognized.

There were quite a number of parishes having business to come before the committee, and the following disposition was made of the various cases:

St. Luke's Church, Brantford—This was constituted a travelling mission, and \$500 was placed in the bishop's hands for its services.

The Moravian Indians, having contributed \$100 for repairing their church, \$100 was appropriated for the work of the year.

The sum of \$100 was set aside for the expenses of clergy moving into the diocese.

St. Thomas Church, Dover—Leave was given to build a new church, and a certain sum was ordered to be paid out of the endowment fund, subject to the approval of the chancellor.

Port Lambton—Leave was given to build a new church, and a certain sum was ordered to be paid out of the endowment fund, subject to the approval of the chancellor.

St. John's Church, St. Thomas—Leave was given to sell the old rectory and build a new one with the proceeds.

St. James Church, Paris—Leave was given to mortgage the parish hall and to sell certain properties, subject to the usual conditions.

Church of the Ascension, Windsor—Leave was given to build a new church, and a certain sum was ordered to be paid out of the endowment fund, subject to the approval of the chancellor.

St. John's Church, Sandwich—Leave was given to build a new church, and a certain sum was ordered to be paid out of the endowment fund, subject to the approval of the chancellor.

Thirty-seven per cent. of the children recovered in less than three weeks, whereas, under ordinary treatment, the mildest attacks lasted two and sometimes five or six months. Of the rest 40 per cent. improved greatly, while the remaining 23 per cent. were not affected either for good or bad.

Dr. Roux, while declaring the experiments thus far were on too small a scale to make a definite pronouncement, said he believed an effective cure is in sight.
