

BLACK BROOM WON THE CONNAUGHT CUP

Defeated Hearts of Oak and Fountain Fay.

ONLY FOUR STARTED

Winner, Owned By A. Newell of Toronto Was An Outsider.

MONTREAL, June 10.—Black Broom, owned by A. Newell, Toronto, and ridden by Jockey Schuttlinger, won the Connaught cup at Bluebonnets this afternoon by a narrow margin. Out of fourteen original nominations only four horses went to the post in this event. Hearts of Oak, the Canadian-bred horse, which won the stake a year ago, was the choice of the favorite, and Black Broom was an outsider. Hearts of Oak gave Fountain Fay a brush for second place and lost by only a nose. The fourth horse in the contest for the cup was Sir John Hendrie's Priet total.

ITALIANS IN SIGHT OF TRIESTE CITY

From Heights Near Monfalcone They See Into Desired Town.

[Canadian Press.] UDINE, Italy, June 10.—(Via Paris, 3:45 p.m.)—Italian troops are within sight of the city of Trieste. From the heights near Monfalcone they can see the city, the capture of which is one of the main objectives of the Italian campaign.

The occupation of Monfalcone is regarded by the Italians as of great importance. Less than a score of miles from Trieste, the possession gives the Italians control of the chief railway junction of that region. It prevents the Austrians from transporting troops or ammunition between Trieste and Tolmino and Gradisca. Monfalcone is the centre of electrical supply for Trieste and has large shipbuilding yards.

On taking possession of Monfalcone the Italians ran up their flag on the ruins of an ancient tower held by the Venetians. The capture of the town is being celebrated today by the Italian troops.

Austrians Try Floods. The Austrians have attempted to transform the lower region of the Isonzo river into a flooded country, duplicating the feat of the Allies in Belgium, for the purpose of halting the Italian advance. Dykes were opened, banks of the river were broken down, and several canals were tapped. The results achieved were insignificant, however, as most of the water was either absorbed by the earth or carried off by ditches. No serious inconvenience for the invading Italians was occasioned.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT. ROME, June 10.—(Via London, June 11.—1:37 a.m.)—The following official communication was issued this evening:

"Nothing of importance has occurred on the frontiers of Tyrol and Trentino except the occupation of Podestagno, to the north of Cortina.

"During the night of June 9-10 the Austrians renewed their attack on Fretz, but they were repulsed with serious losses.

"Along the Isonzo the struggle continues. To overcome the enemy's stubborn resistance we have occupied the citadel and heights dominating Monfalcone."

BERLIN PRESS SILENT

Not a Comment Made on American Note or Its Receipt.

WILLIAM BUCKINGHAM DIES AT STRATFORD

Formerly Deputy Minister of Interior and Widely Noted Editor.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Stratford, June 11.—William Buckingham, at one time private secretary to Hon. Alexander Mackenzie, prime minister of Canada from 1873 to 1878, and former deputy minister of interior in the Liberal administration, passed away at his residence here today, aged 83 years. He has been living retired for the past two years, having been up to that time manager of the British Mortgage and Loan Company.

Mr. Buckingham entered his newspaper career as a shorthand writer upon the North of England Press. He came to Canada in 1857 and joined the Toronto Globe staff, but went West in 1859 and established the Nor'Wester at the Red River settlement, now Winnipeg, the first newspaper in that part of Canada.

He was editor and proprietor of the Norfolk Reformer, and in 1882 became editor and proprietor of the Stratford Beacon. He wrote "Recollections of Canadian Statesmen," and conjointly with Hon. G. W. Ross, the author of "Hon. Alex. Mackenzie: His Life and Times."

Mr. Buckingham was a Liberal of unflinching fealty all his life.

CAPTAIN OF EMDEN HAS REACHED VIENNA

Escaped When Raider Was Sunk—Says Dardanelles Cannot Be Forced.

[Canadian Press.] Vienna, via London, June 11.—An interview with Capt. Von Muecke, formerly of the German cruiser Emden in which he says the forcing of the Dardanelles and the taking of Constantinople are impossible, is published by the newspapers here. He declares submarines are likely to cut off the water supply of allied troops on the Gallipoli Peninsula, which would compel them to surrender, as they would be unable to return to their transports.

Capt. Von Muecke apparently has arrived at Vienna, after having piloted the landing party which was under his command when the Emden was sunk from Cocos Island to safety at Damascus, whence it was not difficult for them to reach Constantinople.
