

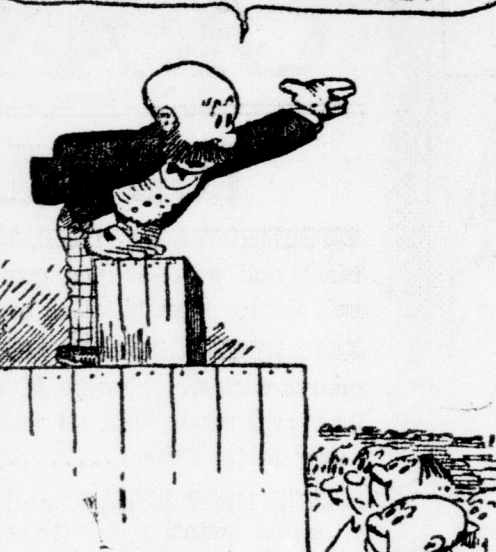

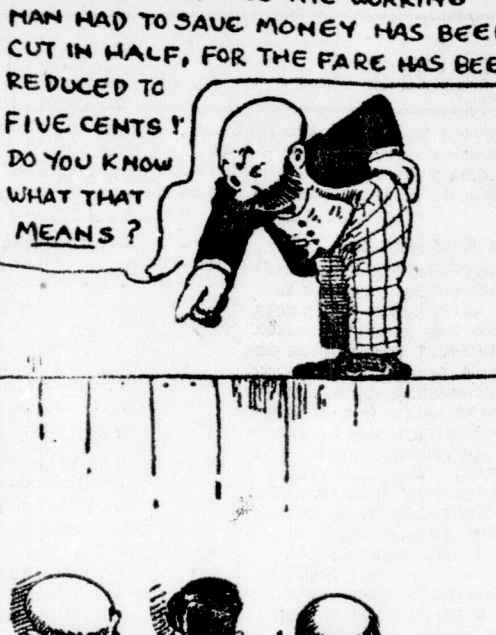

JARVIS AND SILCOX WIN DOUBLES CHAMPIONSHIP

Elmwood Pair Capture Free Press Trophy—Chapman and Allen Get Barnard Trophy—Shea Trophy Goes to Connor and Ashplant.

London bowlers again demonstrated their ability on the greens and captured the three trophies in the Scotch doubles tournament. Each city club is represented in the prizes, the Free Press trophy being won by Jarvis and Silcox of the Elmwood Club, the Barnard trophy by Chapman and Allen of the Thistle Club, and the Shea trophy by Connor and Ashplant of the Rowing Club.

Out-of-town links were eliminated in the semi-finals in the whole three events. In the Free Press trophy events, Gray and Langford won out from Connor and Ashplant, 18 to 10, while Jarvis and Silcox got the long end of a 15 to 10 score from Willie and McPhail of Brantford. The finals provided plenty of excitement, and the result was in doubt until the last bow. Jarvis and Silcox won the final 17 to 16. This trophy is emblematic of the championship of Ontario.

In the semi-finals of the Barnard trophy, Keene and Heaman defeated Lashbrook and Nightingale, 19 to 5, and Chapman and Allen won from Willie and McPhail, 14 to 10. The finals in this event went to Chapman and Allen, who defeated Keene and Heaman, 18 to 8. Chapman and Allen were the winners of the premier trophy last year.

The finish of the Shea (consolation) trophy was also won by Silcox. In the semi-finals Turnbull and McDougall defeated Lashbrook and Nightingale, 19 to 5, and Connor and Ashplant were three up on Willie and McPhail of Brantford. This left the finals to be played between two pairs from the London Rowing and Bowing Club, and the cup went to Connor and Ashplant, who defeated Turnbull and McDougall, 11 to 10.

ELSIE ONWARDO'S VICTORY EXPECTED BY LONDONERS

Mare in Fine Shape and Should Make Clean-up This Summer.

The victory of Elsie Onwardo in the \$1,000 pacing stake at Monroe, Mich., came as no surprise to horsemen in London, who have been watching this baby for some time. She was bred by Ed. Spencer, Crumlin, and has been nursed along in good shape. Last fall she started at the Western Fair, being second three times handily, and showing every mark of a high-class pacer.

The mare was not started at the ice meets, being saved, Jack Boyd of this city has had her in harness since last fall, and has now developed a great racing machine.

Her first start was made last week at Monroe in a class event for a small purse. She was well up, but she was not allowed to get going too fast, as she was being saved for the big events. The race was simply a test to get her keyed up for her stakes.

Yesterday she went out after a big field, and tip-toed home in straight heats. The quality of the crowd was shown by the time, as she had to make the second heat in 2:13, some tracks, in a half-mile ring at this season of the year. She always had plenty left, and none of the wigglers could get her by.

It is said that the London bunch cleaned up last, the mare being backed from start to finish.

Elsie Onwardo was sired by that whirlwind pacer, Knight Onwardo; 2:05 1/4, picked up by Byron McCarthy, Thameville, for little money. He was a fighting rascal, game as a pebble, and ready to give battle to man or horse on the slightest provocation. He is now in the Canadian Northwest. He was the only horse to get a decision against Joe Patchen II when the Big Train cleaned up the grand circuit three years ago. The Knight won a lot of coin for his backers.

Elsie looks like one of the fastest things that has come out of Canada in many a year. She is very fast, has racing manners, and can carry her speed. If she does not get too low a mare, a lot of stakes on the big line should come her way next year.

Jack Boyd has the mare liberally staked, and should win well with her.
