INLAND REVENUE DROPS
Decrease Due to Smaller Returns on Malt and Spirits.

The total receipts from the inland revenue in October were \$50,302.87. The detailed returns follow: Spirits, ex-warehouse, \$554,500; malt, ex-warehouse, \$4,986,322; raw leaf tobacco, unstemmed, ex-warehouse, \$14,048,161; raw leaf, stemmed, ex-warehouse, \$285,141; cigars, ex-factory, \$5,481,121; cigars, ex-warehouse, \$2,040,271; methyated spirits, \$114,051; licenses, \$755; war tax stamps, \$2,132,357; other receipts, \$34,966. Total for October, \$50,302.87; total for October, 1915, \$40,308.36.

The decrease is altogether on malt and spirits due to prohibition.

EAST END LIBRARY

Will be ENLARGED

Improvements May Be Finished Early in the New Year.

The public library board decided last night to make arrangements for carrying through at an early date as possible the necessary improvements at the east branch library, consequent upon the addition of the west store in the town hall. An arch will be cut between the present premises and the west store and the two thrown into one. It is hoped to have the whole place in order early in the new year, but there will be no interruption of library work while the changes are being made.

The librarian's report showed a circulation during October of 18,538. The reference department was used by 2,061 people, of whom nearly 500 received special assistance from the staff. The story hours, which are held on Saturday mornings for the boys and girls, had an attendance of 265 at the main library and 123 at the east branch.

The character of the circulation during the last few months has shown some interesting changes. There is a rapidly growing demand for books on history and those that deal with the war, this class showing a circulation for the last month of nearly a thousand volumes alone. Boile's second volume of his history of the war, dealing as it does with the much-discussed Battle of the Marne, is at present the war book most in demand, and has also caused a marked demand for the earlier volumes describing the opening of the war.

Arrangements were made for having the London Public Library well represented at the annual meeting of the London District Library Institute, which will be held at St. Thomas on Tuesday next.

Those present at the meeting were Rev. Dr. Flanders (chairman), W. H. Winnett, Thomas Gillean, Ben. Noble, Rev. Dr. Sage, Dr. A. O. Jeffery, Rev. Father Foley and Librarian London.

PETER'S LONDON

MIKE TANCREADE FOUND GUILTY OF BARBADO MURDER

Sentence Will Not Be Passed for Several Days.

PRISONER IS STOICAL

Receives the Jury's Decision Quietly and Without Emotion.

Convicted of the murder of Raffello Barbado on the evening of April 9 last, Mike Tancreade will be sentenced to die on the gallows.

Mr. Justice Lennox will pass the sentence of death on the convicted man within a day or two.

The case was given to the jury at 4:22 yesterday afternoon and at 5:27 the twelve men filed into the courtroom and presented a verdict of guilty of murder.

The face of Mike Tancreade, whose fate the twelve men before him had just decided, wore a puzzled expression.

He knew not a word of English and could not understand what it all meant. The court interpreter, Dominico Casotto, was sent for and his lordship instructed him to inform Tancreade that he had been found guilty of murder.

Took it Stoically.

As the interpreter spoke in Tancreade's native tongue the words that meant his fate had been decided the expression of the convicted man's face remained as motionless as the wall.

If the truth dawned upon Tancreade he did not betray his emotions in his facial expression.

At the moment seemed far away.

Peter White, K. C., crown prosecutor, moved formally for the sentence of the court and his lordship stated sentence would be passed in a day or two.

Power to Commute.

The department only has the power to commute the death sentence and whether clemency will be asked in the case of Tancreade after the death sentence is passed remains yet to be seen.

Should Tancreade be hanged it will be the first execution since the hanging of "Popple" Brown on May 17, 1909, who expired in his crime on the gallows for the murder of Policeman Toohy.

Edmund Meredith, K.C., in addressing the jury, called attention to the fact that the jury had the selection of one of three verdicts in the case, murder, manslaughter or acquittal.

"Gentlemen, upon you devolves a most serious duty, you have to decide before you decide," said Mr. Meredith.

He outlined the case and stated that the evidence of some of the witnesses had been exceedingly contradictory.

"According to the evidence submitted, you are not justified in bringing in any verdict against this prisoner.

"When a man's mind is so impaired by liquor that he does things without his mind, then, according to the law, if he did commit the crime he could be found guilty of manslaughter only, not murder."

Prosecutor's Address.

Crown-prosecutor Peter White, K.C., commenced his address to the jury at 2:30 o'clock.

"The prisoner at the bar has been given a fair and impartial trial. His defence has been conducted by two of the ablest members of the bar.

"Your duty here is to decide whether this prisoner is guilty, or not, of the crime with which he is charged, your verdict to be based entirely upon the evidence which you have heard."

"My learned friend closed his address by asking mercy. It is not for you to extend mercy; it is for you to find a verdict in this case.

"I have endeavored to elucidate this matter as much as possible and help you to arrive at a verdict.

"I thank you, gentlemen, for your careful attention," said Prosecutor White, in closing his address.

Queen Fair Play

His Lordship Mr. Justice Lennox, in his charge to the jury, called attention to the fact that every means had been adopted to give the prisoner a fair trial and justice. He called attention to the question of a motive.

His lordship in referring to the conversation in the yard between Cereno and Tancreade, though there was some object in view when Cereno argued with Tancreade to sell the revolver to Lippo.

"A great deal has been said about the crown being bound to do certain things. The crown is bound only to place the facts dispassionately before the jury, and it is for the jury to decide dispassionately on the evidence adduced," said his lordship.

Points of Law.

The question of manslaughter was next dealt with by his lordship, who stated that a man holding a revolver, who aims and discharges it at another and kills him, he is prima facie guilty of murder until the defence can prove it to be the lesser crime.

His lordship closed his address to the jury at 4:20 and the fate of Mike Tancreade was then placed in the hands of the twelve men, who retired at once to the jury-room.

HORSE THIEF CAPTURED ON FARM NEAR INGERSOLL

Local Detectives' Clever Work Aided in His Arrest.

As a result of some clever work by the local detectives, Norman Decker, alias Lynch, was placed under arrest on a farm near Ingersoll yesterday afternoon.

He was taken to Chatham last night to answer to a charge of having stolen a horse and buggy one Sunday last from Walter Lethbridge, a Chatham liverman.

On Wednesday the local detectives picked up their first clue when the stolen horse was found in the field of Mr. Quick near Waverland. A fine wire belonging to Mr. Quick had been stolen, and the Chatham horse left in its place.

On Wednesday Mr. Lethbridge and Dr. Rhoady of Chatham came to London and got the horse. They were advised by the detectives to go to Ingersoll and Dorchester and search for the thief.

They did so, and found him on a farm near Ingersoll. Decker had just hired out with a farmer named McKay, to work, and had sold the stolen buggy and was trying to sell the horse.

ENGINEERS' DRAFT LEAVES FOR ST. JOHN

Majority of the Men Who Left Last Night Are Americans.

A moderate crowd saw the Engineers' draft off for St. John, Que., last night. Most of the men were Americans, and had not been in the country long enough to acquire many friends.

The draft, composed of 31 men under Capt. Caldwell, fell in on the corps' parade ground at 8 p.m. The pipe band of the A. M. C. had been secured, and, taking their station at the head of the men, led the way down town.
