

MONTREAL MEN HINDER TALKS ON RECRUITING

Frequent Interruptions During
Address by R. B. Bennett
and Patenaude.

BORDEN STARTS TOUR

Premier Commences Much-
Delayed Patriotic Cam-
paign of Dominion.

MONTREAL, Dec. 6.—Sir Robert L. Borden, premier of Canada, and Mr. R. B. Bennett, M.P., director-general of national service, opened a campaign at the Monument National here tonight that is calculated to stir up the people of Canada to better understanding of their duty in the world war, and to a realization that every person who can do so should help to gain the victory for the Allies. The campaign is to take the premier and director-general west as far as the coast, and tomorrow night they are to be in Quebec.

Sir Robert Borden was even an excited speaker, but Mr. Bennett was subjected to a good many interruptions. That there was a hostile element present was brought out more clearly when Hon. E. L. Patenaude, minister of inland revenue, was speaking. He was almost continually interrupted and the force of his address was lost largely in reports. The disturbance was so marked that Hon. T. C. Casgrain and Hon. C. J. Doherty, who were to have spoken, decided to remain silent.

Justice of 'Just' Cause.
The gathering was large. Luther Gravel, president of the chamber of commerce, and Mr. H. B. Walker, president of the board of Canada, and joint chairmen. The prime minister spoke both in English and French, and Hon. Mr. Patenaude spoke in French. The premier said that the justice of the cause of the Allies, the patriotism and suffering of the French and Belgians, the splendid response of all the overseas dominions of Canada, and the part in the great war, and said that point with pride and gratitude to the fact that during a little more than two years ago, Canadians have responded to the call of duty, more than 150,000 have seen service at the front, and more than 100,000 of them are in the fighting line.

Depends on Organization.
He emphasized the point that "victory depends upon the thorough organization of Canada, and of Great Britain," for the national strength, and said, "The Government has determined that an estimate shall be made on the main power of Canada, and the board of national service, created for this purpose, will place before the people in the immediate future the means by which that estimate can be effectively made."

So important is this work regarded, Sir Robert said, he had abandoned, for a few weeks, duties of great urgency, in order to urge upon the people of the Dominion the need of organization. "So the director-general and board of national service find it their present duty to estimate the human energy of Canada and to have that estimate accompanied by such information as will enable each man to render his part of the state service which he will be best qualified to give and service of most value to his country. But in the end, however, must be placed in the appreciation by the people of the need and their conception of the duty which lies at their door."

Refers to Question Cards.
The information which it is desired to tabulate is set forth in a card embodying 24 questions, and it is hoped the answer to these questions will prove to be the information desired by those appointed to receive them."

He announced that the answers would be expected to be sent in the first week in the new year.
"Let that week be dedicated by the people of Canada to the national service of the country," he added.
Hon. Mr. Patenaude's interruptions were young men in the galleries, and almost from the start they indulged in frequent cries, cat-calls, and cat-calls. He claimed that the recruiting campaign he and his colleagues had been conducting in this province for some months had borne good fruit, and he said it was a realization of this fact that was the cause of the disturbance tonight.

Not True French-Canadians.
The minister, addressing the press representatives present, assured them that the persons interrupting him were not expressing the sentiments of the whole French-Canadian race, nor were they representative of any considerable portion of the French-Canadians.
Mr. Bennett followed Hon. Mr. Patenaude, and the same noisy element in the galleries proceeded to spoil his speech. He managed to say more than the minister of inland revenue had been permitted to say, however, and by persisting he succeeded in putting the question of organization for national service before the audience with some degree of satisfaction to those who wished to hear. National service means simply duty and conservation, he said, and he pointed out that every Canadian must take his share in the war in some manner.

American Notes Cannot Change Submarine War

Germany Will Be Guarded by
Own Interests—Little
Gained in Rumania.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—A wireless dispatch received here from Rome says: "The Cologne Gazette declares that in her submarine warfare Germany will be guided by her own interests and will not allow herself to be influenced by American threats or suggestions." "The Frankfurter Zeitung warns Germany against expecting double rations as a result of the invasion of Rumania. It says the Russo-Rumanians may save their harvests and granaries, which are estimated situated mainly on the lower Danube in territory which has not yet been invaded."

TRYING TO ESCAPE
Interfered German Vessels in Brazil Getting Ready To Depart.

RIO JANEIRO, Dec. 6.—Extraordinary activity has been noted for several weeks on board the German ships interned here, according to the Journal. Some of the vessels have been receiving provisions and coal and others have been clearing their decks. According to the Journal there is every indication that the ships are preparing to set out secretly in order to avoid requisition.

RENEWED ACTIVITY ON WESTERN FRONT NETS ENEMY LITTLE

Raid on British Lines Fail,
Reports London.

LONDON, Dec. 6.—The official communication from British headquarters in France issued tonight reads: "This morning we successfully raided enemy trenches southeast of Neuville St. Vaast. The enemy attempted to raid west of Beuvrin and northeast of Focleux. Both failed. We took a few prisoners." "On the rest of the front, except for some heavy shelling in the neighborhood of Beaumont l'Abbaye and Mequignies, and on our front north of the Aisne, there was no event of importance."

GAINED ONLY OUTER ELEMENTS.
PARIS, Dec. 6.—The bulletin issued by the war office tonight reads: "On the Somme front artillery fighting was quite active on both sides, in the region of Bouchavesnes." "In Champagne our artillery took under its fire, and dispersed, an enemy detachment northeast of Fontaine-en-Dormois."

"On the left bank of the Meuse, the Germans, after intense artillery preparation, attacked at 3:30 o'clock in the afternoon a salient of our lines on the slopes east of Hill 994. Received with a violent fire from our machine guns, the enemy was able to gain a footing only in some advanced elements." "Belgian communication: "In the evening and during the course of the night, heavy fighting occurred in the region of Dixmude. The artillery was quite active on both sides of the river front."

NO MORE CHAPLAINS WILL GO OVERSEAS

Surplus Causes New Orders Restricting
Further Appointments.

TORONTO, Dec. 6.—No more chaplains are to leave Canada with the expeditionary forces, according to orders which have been sent out from Ottawa to the general officers commanding the various military districts. This means not only that no more chaplains will be sent overseas, but that no more chaplains will be sent to the front or to the hospitals and training camps. The order probably will be in force until the end of the war, unless the strength of the Canadian forces is greatly increased.

GERMAN RADICALS ARE WHIPPED INTO LINE
Parrot-Like They Declare Germany Must Have Colonies Back.

AMSTERDAM, Dec. 6, via London.—A Berlin dispatch says that the war aims of the German Radicals have been set forth by Professor Karl Doehmann, leader of the Radical party in the Reichstag, as follows: "We do not reject annexations. If our rulers believe them necessary from a military or economic point of view, we cannot permit the Entente to declare an economic war against us after we have won the war. We must back all our colonies. Germany must be assured of her right to exist independently, and to develop as she chooses."

CONCESSION TO MEN
AVERTS STRIKE ON C. N. R.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 6.—The threatened strike of Canadian Northern Railway maintenance of way employees has been averted. An agreement embodying a new schedule of wages and a substantial concession to the men in respect to working conditions, was reported this morning, after a board of conciliation, appointed under the industrial dispute act of 1907 had sat for two weeks, every day. The board of conciliation was headed by E. L. Taylor, K.C., chairman. The other members were Wm. Crox, formerly superintendent of the C. N. R. shops here, representing the Canadian Northern Railway, and David Campbell, barrister, representing the men.

BIG SHIPYARDS DEAL IS NOW COMPLETED
COLLINGWOOD, Dec. 6.—The agreement entered into by the directors for the sale of the Collingwood Shipbuilding Company's assets to Messrs. H. E. Smith, R. M. Wolvin and Captain J. W. Norcross, was confirmed at a special meeting of the shareholders held here today. The formal transfer will take effect on January 2 next. The deal includes the transfer of the yards and plant here, also the company's interest in the shipyard at Kingston, where the Government graving dock is, under lease.
