Lightning Burns
Nissouri Barn
William Duffin Lost All Season's Crops in Destructive Blaze.

THORNDALE, Sept. 1.—During the heavy thunderstorm this afternoon the fine barns of William Duffin, con. 3, West Nissouri, were struck by lightning and completely destroyed, with all the season's crops. The flames also destroyed a drivehouse and granary adjoining. By hard work the hogs and hens were saved. The loss, which will run into several thousands of dollars, is only partially covered by insurance. LONDONER HELD IN CONNECTION WITH HOLD-UP

Charles Anderson Alleged To Be Implicated in Port Burwell Affair.

ST. THOMAS, Sept. 1.—Charles Anderson, 60 Palace street, London, was arrested yesterday afternoon at that city on a warrant charging him with being implicated in the recent hold-up at Port Burwell. Mr. Anderson was taken to Port Burwell last evening and was arraigned today before Police Magistrate Backus and later was allowed out on bail. Mr. Anderson is said to be an engineer on the C. P. R., London. Anderson's apprehension was brought about in a peculiar manner. The bandits visited the home of Mrs. Cameron in Port Burwell and were interrupted by C. H. Travis of that village. They left the Cameron home suddenly and Travis gave chase. At the sheds of the Methodist Church the robbers turned on him and fired several shots, forcing him to give up the chase. The robbers escaped in a high-powered automobile. Travis, in company with Detective Chute, later searched the path taken by a gold watch, which had evidently been dropped by one of them. From marks in the watch, Detective Chute traced its ownership to a London jeweler, who identified it as a watch he had given out in exchange for a repair watch some time previously. He named Anderson as the man who had brought in the watch for repair and had been given the other watch to carry. Detective Chute visited London Wednesday morning for the purpose of apprehending Anderson and questioning him about the robbery, but did not find him. Hearing that he was wanted by the police, Anderson is reported to have visited the London News office, declaring that he was innocent of the burglary.

In The MOVIES

AT THE GRAND.
"The Miracle of Manhattan" is the feature picture now appearing at the Grand Theatre and being shown three times today and again on Saturday. Elaine Hammerstein takes the leading role and is supported by an all-star cast.

The story deals with a young society girl, Evelyn Whitney, who has become engaged to a man of prominence, although he is nearly twice her age and has a rather unenviable reputation. One night she is aroused by a noise in the kitchen and going downstairs discovers a girl-tramp eating ravenously and with a large collection of the household silver at her side. In reply to Evelyn's questions the girl tells her that she has been in the country but two months and unable to find any employment, and in desperate circumstances she had entered the room in search of money and food. Evelyn does not believe her story and suggests that they change places to try out her side of life.

From time immemorial the early days of married life have been the subject of farcical comedy and humor. In all that time it has lost none of its fun-producing possibilities. Proof of this is borne out in "A Full House," an excellent comedy drama appearing at the Allen Theatre during the last half of this week. Little other recommendation is needed for the picture than the fact that Bryant Washburn, one of the most popular comedians of the screen, appears in the leading role. The play is the screen version of the uproarious stage farce of the same name.

In the production Mr. Washburn appears as George Howell, a young attorney who gets into a maze of difficulties when he leaves his bride a few hours after the knot has been tied to go to another city on a business trip. The plot, based on the world-old story of suspicions and circumstantial evidence, twists and turns so that the laugh-producing situations are innumerable, as well as irresistible.

In addition to the young and funny policeman, mixed in generous quantities, a regular vamp, another man's love letters and some stolen jewelry are the main ingredients of the comedy.

Mr. Washburn's impersonation is a finely-drawn characterization that brings a continual stream of laughter. Opposite him Louis Wilson appears to good advantage. There are other well-known players.

The boy, Edgar, is presented again in another of Booth Tarkington's wholesome and refreshing comedy stories of boy life. The picture is called "Edgar's Feast Day." There is also an episode of the "Hope Diamond Mystery," a film of adventure and other screen features.

LONDON NURSE TO BE LADY SUPERINTENDENT OF TORONTO HOSPITAL

Miss D. Hutchinson and Miss J. Mortimore of Victoria Staff Resign.

At the regular meeting of the hospital trust, held at Victoria Hospital on Thursday afternoon, the resignations of Miss J. Mortimore, assistant superintendent of the hospital, and Miss D. Hutchinson, head nurse of the operating room, were accepted with regret. Miss Hutchinson has accepted the position of head nurse of the Victoria Hospital, Toronto. Her resignation is effective September 10, while that of Miss Mortimore is effective at once.

Appointments to fill the vacancies caused by these resignations were referred to the house committee, composed of W. M. Garthshore and James Gray, with power. Tenders for meat supplies for the hospital for the ensuing year were opened, and Anderson & Co. were awarded the contract, their being the lowest bid.

Superintendent T. Heard's report for July was read, showing the number of patients admitted 363, number of patients discharged 424, births 30, Deaths 15, treatments at free dispensary 553, cash receipts \$15,067.74. Accounts were passed at the meeting totalling \$25,640.

All the members of the trust were present, namely, Lieut.-Col. W. M. Garthshore (chairman), James Gray, J. W. Laidlaw, Mayor E. J. Little and Supt. T. H. Heard.

FATALLY HURT WHEN CREEPING UNDER TRAIN

Harry Aldort Mangled At Waterloo Crossing in Kitchener.

KITCHENER, Sept. 1.—The unprotected Grand Trunk crossing at Waterloo street, where there are eight lines of railway tracks, was the scene of a fatal accident today, the victim being Henry Aldort of 170 South Cedar street, a local junk dealer. According to eyewitnesses, he attempted to crawl under the Galt-Elmira train, and when it started to move, he became confused. The body was horribly mutilated, one leg being cut off almost entirely. Death was instantaneous. An inquest will be held on Friday. Aldort was 45 years of age and leaves a wife and seven children.

Laying Corner-Stone.
The corner-stone of the Y. M. C. A. building at the corner of Wellington and Weber streets will be laid Saturday afternoon by Mayor Grebe.

Agents of the company from coast to coast have been in attendance, and the convention was the best ever held in the annals of the institution. Wednesday a banquet was held in the new assembly hall, which proved a most delightful affair. Thursday afternoon a big family picnic was held in the Waterloo Park, winding up with a fine band concert by the band of the Waterloo Musical Society and a dance in the pavilion.

Clark Van Every of Waterloo died at his home today, aged 73 years. He had resided in Waterloo for over a quarter of a century. His widow, two sons and three daughters survive.

The Y. P. A. convention, which has been in progress in the Evangelical Church, Waterloo, the past two days, came to a close tonight. Many delegates were present from all parts of the province, and it was one of the most successful yet held.

COMPLETE REPAIRS BEFORE FAIR WEEK

Pavement at Main Corner Now Torn Up For Many Feet.

Preparation for the Western Fair are well underway, the pavement on Richmond street, immediately south of the intersection of Dundas street, between and in the vicinity of the street car tracks has been torn up for many feet, making one-half of the road almost impassable.

It is a time-honored custom in this city that some portion of the roadway in the business section of Dundas, Richmond or King streets should be torn up during the Western Fair week. Almost without exception the traffic is disrupted each year in this way and an unsightly blotch of destruction impressed upon the minds of all visitors.

Although at times the city engineering department has done its share to disrupt things, it is not the only or most frequent offender. The City Gas Company and the London street railway have also been guilty of offences of this nature from time to time. This year the destruction of the roadbed on Richmond street is being wrought by the street railway company.

However, things may be not as bad as they seem. For Manager C. B. King of the London street railway assured The Advertiser yesterday that the company had no evil designs against Fair week. The work at the intersection, he said, will be completed by the end of this week or long before the opening of the Fair, and the brick pavement replaced smoother and better than before.

The company is replacing a switch-point at the southwest corner of the crossing, which has become worn after ten years' of continuous service. The bricks, too, are being levelled.

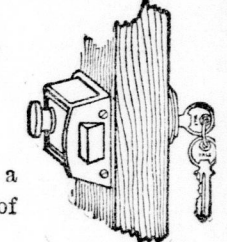
