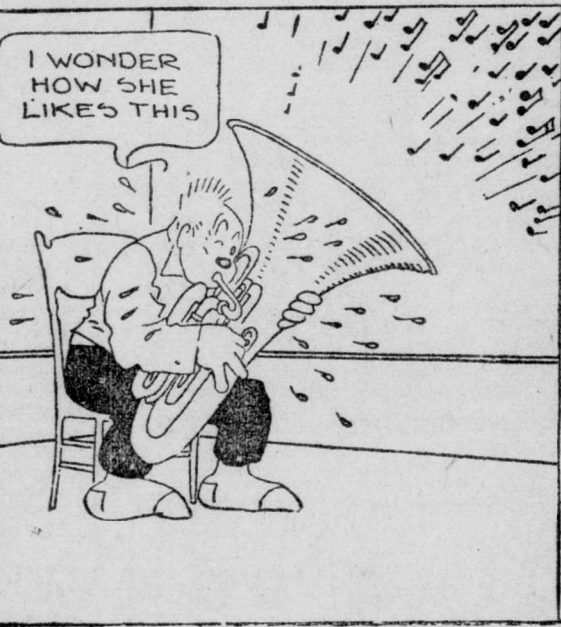
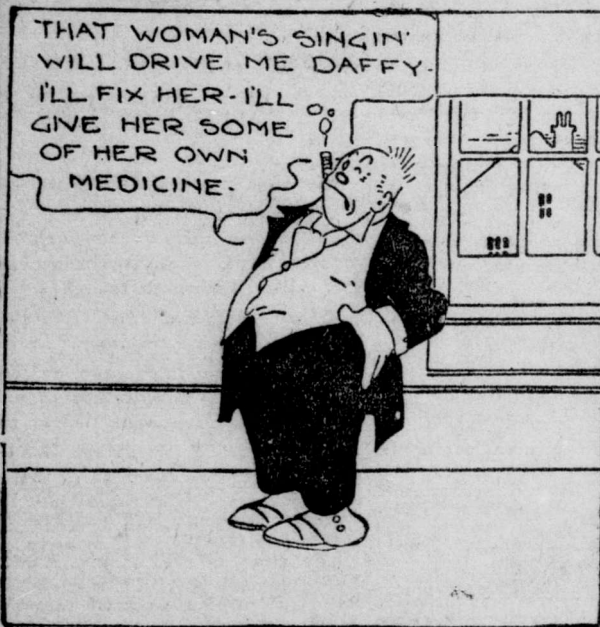

"Dick" Croker Success As Thoroughbred Horse Breeder In Ireland

Former Tammany Leader, Now Eighty, Visits New York and Recalls Many Racing Incidents

NEW YORK, Oct. 27.—No single individual, taking the number of years he has been connected with the industry into consideration, has had greater success in breeding thoroughbreds than Richard Croker, the one-time leader of Tammany, but long a resident of Ireland, who is paying his annual visit to New York in company with Mrs. Croker.

Mr. Croker came into racing through his friendship for Michael F. Dwyer, and he was for a time associated with Gen. H. Jackson, the owner of the ship of the Belle Mead Stud in Tennessee. It wasn't till he went abroad, however, that he began to do big things in the way of blood stock production. The foundation for his success as a breeder was laid within the American mare, Rhoda B., by Hanover, out of Marguerite, by Albion, which he won in 1890.
