**Cheaper Poultry Feed**

On account of the scarcity and high price of feed, the poultry industry of this country is threatened by the prospect of the wholesale slaughter of laying stock.

To provide poultrymen with suitable feed, the federal department of agriculture has requested the millers throughout Canada to put on the market the cracked and shrunken wheat removed from the grain before it is milled. This material is specially recommended for backyard, suburban and professional poultrymen, but owing to its containing weed seeds, including several kinds of mustards, care should be exercised on the farm in its use, and all cleanings from yards and poultry houses where it is fed would have to be disposed of so as not to disseminate noxious weeds in grain fields.

The mills cannot be expected to keep this class of feed unless there is a demand, therefore those interested should immediately arrange with local mills and feed dealers for a supply.
