What makes you think that he is not dead? If he was dead the man would not be holding him.

Do you think that he is conscious? It is hard to say whether he is conscious or not.

If he is conscious what is the matter with him? If he is conscious, he is exhausted.

What would cause him to be exhausted? Fear of death, fatigue, cold, exposure to the violence of a raging sea, want of sleep, lack of nourishment, or any one and certainly all of these would be sufficient to exhaust a very strong constitution.

What is there on the crests of the waves? There is foam on the crests of the waves.

Express the idea contained in the last sentence using the word crest as a verb. The waves are crested with foam.

Will the vessel in the distance see the raft and pick up the two unfortunates on it? It is not easy to answer but it is be hoped that she will.
