The lion perceived Unxele's knee exposed, took a bite out of it, and left him a cripple for life. The party rose to their feet on the cry of their young chief, hurled another set of spears at the majestic animal, and soon dispatched him.

The present condition of the Caffres, on the Cape frontier, is very different from what this sketch exhibits. Here is a couple, well fed, of cheerful look, and for natives, they are ordinarily clad. The milk basket is at their feet, with a
