- 4. Accommodation for the use of the delegation was reserved at Claridge's Hotel, London. The accommodation consisted of a suite for the Prime Minister, a bedroom and salon for Messrs. Robertson, Cadieux, Gibson and LeBlanc, a bedroom for each of the other persons on the delegation, office space, a press briefing room, and a delegates' lounge.
- 5. The actual daily cost of this accommodation, including service charges and Selective Employment Tax, was: Delegates' accommodation, £254.5.6; Office space, £53.9.6; Press room, £49.9.0; Delegates' Lounge, £31.12.6.

- 7. Expenses for international conferences of this kind are defrayed from the Department of External Affairs vote for International Conferences (see page 120 of Revised Main Estimates, 1968-69). The total figure for this item in the estimates is based on the number of conferences anticipated in any one fiscal year, and taking into account expenses of previous meetings, rather than by allocating a specific budget figure to each individual conference. A review of Appendix 7 of the Department's Annual Report for 1967 shows that Canada was officially represented at more that 200 conferences in that year.
