debate. In fact, those were not two full days. This was just before the adjournment.

Six members from my Party, including myself, spoke on the debate. I believe an equal number of members from the New Democratic Party spoke on the debate. For some reason Conservative Members chose not to participate in the debate.

I am sure that the Hon. Member would not want to mislead the House by suggesting that two days of debate and 12 speakers on a major tax Bill constitutes undue delay as opposed to responsible comment.

Mr. John Gormley (The Battlefords—Meadow Lake): Mr. Speaker, in response to the Hon. Member's point of order, it was certainly not my intention to mislead the House. I think that if she were to check the "blues" she would find that the words which she has attributed to me about delay are indeed true. I talked about being delayed by the Opposition in general terms. I did not use a term such as "undue delay" or the sort of words that she has described.

My concern about this Bill, and I acknowledge it is a significant tax Bill, is that the clause to which I have expressed a concern is the clause that deals frankly with the fuel tax rebate. In my part of the country, as in all agricultural areas of Canada, there is a considerable interest in ensuring that federal fuel tax rebates are prolonged and extended by the Government. That was my reason for asking the question. I was concerned.

Mr. Speaker: I might indicate that this is perhaps straying beyond a point of order, but out of respect for the Hon. Member for Trinity I will hear her briefly.

Miss Nicholson: Mr. Speaker, I do not want to prolong this matter. I cannot help but comment on the fact that if the Government had not imposed the additional tax there would not be a need for the rebate the Hon. Member talks about.

Some Hon. Members: Hear, hear!

Mr. Speaker: It is perhaps time to close off this exchange.
