SEED PROGRAM

Mr. Peter Milliken (Kingston and the Islands): Mr. Speaker, on February 8 the federal government cut \$41.8 million from the Summer Employment Experience Development Program. This program provided almost 72,000 summer jobs for students in the past year, thus giving students the opportunity to gain valuable work experience and to earn money to help fund their education.

By slashing \$41 million from this program, a total of 17,000 fewer students will obtain jobs this summer.
