WESTERN ONTARIO HONORS FOR BERLIN

Defeat Western University of
London in Fast Game at
the Arena.

Berlin O.H.A. intermediate champions, added the Western Ontario championship to their string of titles last night by defeating Western University of London, Northern League winners, 6 to 4, at the Arena. It was a grand little tussle all the way, with the Dutchmen's weight turning the tide in the second half.

The Londoners had the better of the play in the first half, and showed more speed than any team that has played at the arena this season. Berlin came fast in the second half, and checking hard all the way, stopped up the college boys and were doing better at the finish than at any time during the contest.

Both teams showed pretty combination play, with London at times trying too much passing, especially when in close to the goal. McAvoy was the speediest man on the ice, and went the full route at top speed. Dave Reid gathered all the London tallies and checked nicely. He was the only man for the losers to bore in close to the net. Griffin was good in spots, and Schumacker did his best work in the first half.

Truschinski was a horse for work, and his lone rushes carried him to the net every trip. He checked hard and kept skating the London forwards into the fence throat. Boettger didn't strike his stride until the second half, and then he had it over every man on the ice.

Soleman fitted in nicely into the team play and scored three goals, winning the first half. The second half was a heavy pace and the weight of the Dutchmen broke up London's pretty passing and speed after the rest, and Berlin came fast towards the close, winning by 6 to 4.

Opening of Competition at
Hartford for American
Honors.

HARTFORD, Conn., March 20.—Competition for the American figure skating championship of America, and in two other championships was begun here tonight on the Arena ice rink. As the judging is done on a loose and prescribed figure skating, the decisions will not be given until tomorrow, competitors being required only to skate on form today. The contests are the first to be held in this country under the international rules of the International Skating Union of America. They are restricted to amateurs.

In the ladies' championship competition on prescribed figures, the contest today narrowed down to two members of the skating factory club of Boston—Miss E. E. Roth and Miss T. Weld. They will meet tomorrow for the championship on free skating.

The competitors for the men's figure championship are: Norman Scott of Montreal, Dr. Kingsley Field, N. W. Niles, L. W. Howland and A. W. Atkinson of the Skating Club of Boston, and Vincent Winn, of New York.

The third championship is in pair skating for the first time in the U. S., and were: Miss Chevalier and Norman Scott of Montreal, Miss Weld and Mr. Niles of Boston, Mr. and Mrs. Irving Brookway of New York, Miss Crocker and E. M. Howland of Boston, Miss Fuller and L. Joseph of New York, and Miss B. E. Roth and Mr. Crocker of Boston.
