Demonstrating the necessity of vesting this latter power, togethe with the nomination? to all offices of Executive Government, inthe hands of the Monarch, the great Author of the Spirit of Laws, as if he had foreseen our present situation, adds, "But" " if there was no Monarch, and the Exe-" cutive Power was committed to a cer-" tain number of persons selected from the" 46 legislative body, there would be an end of liberty; by reason that the two powers. would be united, as the same persons " would actually fometimes have, and " moreover be always able to have a fhare in both." If therefore the Executive Power of Government be really vested in the persons so selected, self-chosen, indeperidently of the will of the Monarch, we have no King, the Constitution is subverted, and our Liberties are gone. Do not the Leaders of the celebrated Coalition openly boaft, that they remain an unbroken body ?-That all have refigned as one man? And that an Administration formed in the face of their power, cannot continue three days? Is not the attempt of the King to nominate to the several departments of Executive. Government,
