Now, if the expressed opinions of these Now, if the expressed opinions of these experts are correct, and experience is proving that they are correct, then the Town of North Toronto, by sinking additional wells, will simply be endeavoring to lift itself by its boot strang it will bring the water out at deavoring to lift itself by its boot straps, it will bring the water out at one hole and lessen the flow at another. The population of the town in 1901 was 1852, in ten years it has increased to 5400, or trebled itself, and as the ratio of increase in the population will probably be greater in the future than it has been in the past, the probability is that within another five probability is that within another five years, the population will have again trebled, and if the engineers' estimate of a maximum consumption of 100 gal-lons per head of the population, is correct, in five years the town will require 1600,000 gallons per day, which is considerably beyond the highest estimate that has been made of the flow

from these wells. Does this look like an inviting proposition for the property holders of North Toronto, especially in view of the fact that they are offered an abundant supply from the City of Tor-

In conclusion, five eminent geologists have expressed opinions adverse to this proposition, only one has reported in its favor, and his report was inconsist-ent within itself.

Here is food for thought for the voters of North Toronto on Monday.
