Important Capture in Algenquin Park During the past summer several cap-

The catches of the present summer have demonstrated this fact, and one of the greet assets of the park in future will be the knowledge that land-locked salmon, the gamiest in the game fish, was sent to Prof. Edward F. Prince, commissioner of fisheries, Ot-tawa, who determined that it was a true sea salmon, weighing 1 lb. 13 oz. It is what is called a grilse specimen of the Atlantic salmon, and as all anglers are aware, is one of the finest game

The famous fish expert, Norris, has stated that there was nothing to sur-pass a grilse in its symmetry, its agility and its pluck, so that anglers in the park have a prospect of splendid

The success of the first planting of these fish in the waters of the park has encouraged the government to further activity in this direction, and a large consignment of the Atlantic salmon will be deposited in these waters

Hundred Children in San Antonio Orphanage.

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., Oct. 30 .- Six Sisters of Charity sacrificed their lives in an attempt to save nearly 100 children in a fire that destroyed St. John's Orphanage today. They succeeded in rescuing all but two children before they were trapped by the flames. Another sister was burned so seriously

that she cannot survive. The dead sisters are: Mother Mary of the Cross, Mother Superior of the Parish; she was Mary Rossiter, native of Wexford, Ireland. Mother Frances Pasteur, native of France. Sister Peter Claver Stevin, teacher in San Fernando school, native of Dublin, Ireland. Sister Leacadia Noian, teacher in San Fernando school, native of Dublin, Ireland. Sister Monica Montez, native of Mexico, and Sister Kostka Farrell, native of Kaldare, Ireland.
