ALD. CHISHOLM RETRACTS ON EXPLANATION OFFERED

Withdraws His Statements Regarding Hospital Patient—Day's Doings at the City Hall.

The remarks of Ald. Chisholm at Monday's council meeting when the hospital matter was under discussion created some consternation. The hospital authorities have announced that Ald. Chisholm was astray of the facts of the case to which he referred, and which was that of an east end young woman, who he said was sent away from the institution under circumstances which showed that the hospital was nothing but a cold-blooded business deal.

The defence was that the young woman had left at her own request. Supt. Dr. Brown states that she insisted on going and Dr. Temple permitted her to depart on account of her pathetic pleading to do so.

Ald. Chisholm told the World yesterday afternoon that he had made his complaint in council upon the authority of a prominent east end business man and he had considered it an absolutely reliable source.

He said, however, that he had learned of the refutation by the superintendent, doctors, nurses and the patient and was anxious to retract the statements he had made, adding that it was far from his thought to do any injustice to anyone.

Should Fight It

The Yonge-street bridge question bobbed up again yesterday in the board of control, and Controller Jones said there was nothing left for the city to do but to fight for the bridge, as it could see nothing to be gained by negotiating further with the railway companies, and it only meant further delay.

We have the court's decision in our favor and under the present order the railway will have to pay the full cost of the bridge, he said.

The cause of delay in the negotiations is attributed to the visit of England of General Manager Hays of the G. T. R. and the board will patiently await his return.

Geary and Rust for England

The mayor will recommend that Ald. Geary, chairman of the board of works, and City Engineer Rust be sent to England to inspect various systems of trunk sewers and septic tanks.

There have been many changes and improvements since Mr. Rust visited England five years ago. Mr. Rust thinks it would be well to have Ald. Geary with him.

Want More Observatory

A. Chude Macdonell, M. P. notified the mayor that in his opinion there was no necessity for a deputation going to Ottawa to urge the government to allow the observatory to remain in Toronto.

At present there was no indication of the government's intention to take the observatory to Ottawa.

At the mayor's suggestion Mr. Macdonell will be requested to urge the government to purchase the observatory in the estimates to build a new observatory on the site provided by the university authorities.

Blair's Residents Kick

Mr. Burwash and G. Kennedy have written the board of control protesting against the action of the city in applying for power to decide the class of pavement to be used by any street by a two-thirds vote of council.

Several Roads Affected by Committee's Action Yesterday

The railway committee of the legislature yesterday received the application of the Hamilton, Caledonia & Lake Erie Railway Co. for permission to increase the capital stock from \$250,000 to \$500,000, and that time be extended for the completion of certain sections.

The application of the James Bay Railway for an extension of the time of franchise was met to the extent of two years being allowed to begin work and four years to complete it.

The operation of the new Railway Act caused a number of clauses to be taken out of the charter of the Toronto & Northeastern Railway Co. of Toronto.

The road is to be run by electricity. Beginning from a point near the city, it is empowered to pass thru the Townships of York, Scarborough, Markham, Whitchurch, Pickering, Uxbridge and Rosch to Ontario County.

JAP TARIFF IS PROTECTIONIST

Tokio, March 27.—The new customs tariff passed the Diet today with slight amendments. The average rate of duty is 13 per cent.

The bill is decidedly protective and retaliatory.

OBJECTED TO LANGUAGE HANDS, BUT NOT PIOT

Serious Affray in Bucharest Where Students Disturb a Charity Performance.

Vienna, March 27.—Serious street rioting occurred at Bucharest, Roumania, last night, and culminated in a conflict between the rioters and the troops, during which two men were killed and over 400 were wounded.

The trouble arose over a demonstration of Roumanian Nationalists against the use of the French language in a performance at the National Theatre.

The Ladies' Charity Society, which is playing the French and thousands of Roumanians, were among the rioters.

Over 100 persons were dispersed. Students took the principal part in the rioting. The firing of revolvers by the French and thousands of Roumanians followed by a riotous charade were arrested.

Two officers, who were injured, died later. Many women and children were among the injured.

Gendarmes pursued the rioting demonstrators to their homes and in many instances broke into houses and arrested the occupants.

Indications Are That Navigation Will Soon Be In Order

Detroit, March 27.—The cold weather last week kept the ice firm and solid, but the warm weather and rain of Sunday, Monday and today has melted the top covering of snow and will allow the sun to cut into the ice freely.

In Lake Superior there are no ice fields over the western portion, the fields over the middle section have decreased materially, over the eastern portion the fields extend from Whiteside Bay to Point St Ignace, where open water is visible about two miles out.

There has been no change in the St. Mary's River. At the straits the ice remains solid.

In Lake Huron the fields are extensive over the northern portion; over the southern end the fields have moved northward under the influence of southerly winds.

Early winds from Lake St. Clair during the week, and a bridge has formed at Fighting Island.

In Lake Erie the fields remain about the same as last week.
