The report represented that to properly construct a public abattoir would cost \$250,000. Present companies in the business, having about \$1,500,000 invested, would have to be bought out or turned down. The only institution of the kind in Canada, the one at Montreal, was a failure. The rates charged there rendered competition with farmers who did their own killing impossible on the part of its patrons, with a result that it was practically idle.
