FAREWELL TO THE SOLDIERS

The Camp on Carling's Heights is Over.

Successful March-Past by All the Troops in the Division.

Thousands of Citizens Witness the Review—Major-General Hutton's Praises for the Men—The Last Night in Camp.

The volunteers, who have been in training on Carling's Heights for the past two weeks, have left for their respective homes throughout Western Ontario. From 7 o'clock to about 9 there was a steady outpour of troops to the G. T. R., C. P. R. and M. C. R. trains. Not only by their bronzed, sun-burned faces did the men show the effect of the sojourn on the heights. To the practiced eye of the soldier, the improved bearing of the "troops" was noticeable in every move. The camp was productive of much good. For the first time Canadian troops were brought together and organized into brigades and divisions, with a staff formed from officers of the Canadian militia, and in several respects this was calculated to inspire increased zeal and enthusiasm among the men.

The spectacular features of the recent camp made it more popular with the citizens also. Any who were fortunate enough to witness the review yesterday afternoon or Thursday's sham battle or tattoo will hold the camp in 1898 in pleasant remembrance for a long time.

The scene on the heights yesterday afternoon was a grand one. When Major-General Hutton conducted the march past and review at 4 o'clock, the troops made a splendid showing and won high praise from the major-general. Five or six thousand citizens, many in carriages, were lined along the brow of the hill to the south of the square in front of the tented camp. This vantage every movement of the several battalions of infantry and the First Hussars could be easily seen. The divisional staff included Major-General Hutton, G.O.C.; Col. Holmes, D.O.C.; Col. Gordon, in command of the First Infantry Brigade; Col. Buchanan, in command of the Second Brigade, and Capt. C. F. Winters, of the Governor General's Foot Guards, D.A.A.G., in command of the division. Men who have been in active service.

During the march past the staff was stationed to the south of the parade-ground. The officers, in their splendid uniforms, formed a striking group, and their superintendence of the movements of the troops was closely followed by the spectators. The infantry was first drawn up in brigades in line of quarter column, the cavalry preceding the first brigade in column of squadrons, and after inspection all were placed in column of double companies. At the center of the parade-ground was a brigade band, which played the regimental march of each battalion as it passed the major-general. Following the march past the cavalry returned in double-quick, and the infantry in mass, subsequently advancing in review order and forming up in a square, where they were addressed by the major-general.

With reference to the inspection review, the major-general made the following points: "The troops were remarkably steady under arms, and the marching, all considered, was well done. Numerous mistakes were made, due to inexperience in ceremonial parades, which require not only more experience on the part of staff officers, but also on the part of the troops themselves. These opportunities can hardly be given in so short a training as twelve days. The determination of troops to acquit themselves well in the march past is, as a rule, a sure means of success. In this instance, success may be considered directly attributable to this. The cadence of both brigades was too hurried, in one 124 and in the other 128 to the minute, in place of the regulation 120. A sufficient interval was not allowed in some instances between battalions. The cavalry, both at a walk and a trot, acquitted themselves remarkably well. The review generally may be considered to have been successful, and with additional opportunities for gaining experience on the part of the staff officers and other senior officers, would have been very successful."

PROGRESS APPRECIATED
Last night orders from headquarters read: "The major-general commanding desires to convey his congratulations to the officers, non-commissioned officers and men of the First Hussars."

and the First Infantry Division upon the success of the year's training. It is, so far as the major-general is aware, the first occasion that Canadian troops have been brought together and organized into brigades and divisions, with a staff in accordance with modern regulations, formed from officers of the Canadian militia. Many changes and reforms have been initiated, both in drill, interior economy and in discipline. The major-general commanding desires to express his warm appreciation at the excellent spirit shown by the troops generally in carrying out the changes necessary to the increased efficiency of the militia of Canada, and for the zeal and enthusiasm generally shown in the performance of duty. Many errors and mistakes have been made, and there are innumerable matters which require amendment and improvement before the militia of Canada can be considered to hold the high place among the forces of the empire which it is the earnest determination of all concerned to insure. The major-general commanding feels confident that next year will bring about the improvement in administration, organization, discipline and drill which all ardent Canadian soldiers are determined to insure.

THE LAST NIGHT.
The "camaraderie" of camp life is never more manifest than on the last night. Fun and good-fellowship are the order for the occasion. This is traditional. And last night the tradition was well borne out. Cooks' parades, in which costumes, the product of which may not properly be called a fine art, yet certainly reveal wonderful inventive genius, are worn, by the frolicsome Tommies, began early and continued late. Franks of all sorts were played by the men on their chums, the wit and the story-teller reigned supreme. Good-fellowship was the distinctive characteristic of the last few hours in camp. There was little sleep to be had in any of the tents until after midnight.

General Hutton left last night for Niagara-on-the-Lake. Col. Gordon will return to Montreal, and Col. Buchanan and Capt. Macdonnell will go to Niagara.

The "ghost" walked last night, but only the commanding officers were waited upon. Some of the companies were paid off until they reach their headquarters. The committee appointed to provide entertainment and instruction for the men of the Twenty-sixth Battalion in connection with the new marquee, which the grant of the new county council enabled the commanding officers to erect, desire to thank the citizens who so abundantly supplied illustrated papers, magazines, etc., for the men's use.

COUNTY TAX RATES

Set by the County Council—Important Reports Adopted—An Evening Session.

FRIDAY.

The county council resumed session this afternoon, and also met in the evening.

The house of refuge committee's first report showed the institution to be well kept. The appointment of Mrs. A. E. Hodgins as assistant matron was confirmed, and her resignation, to take place in July, was accepted. The warden, inspector and keeper were empowered to fill the vacancy. Seventy-five dollars were ordered paid to Ekfrid, re Catharine McLean. Report was adopted.

The jail committee reported that the jail had been found, neat, clean and well kept. No action was recommended relative to the sheriff's request for uniforms for court constables. Reports were recommended for the county registry and county buildings. In their second report, the finance committee recommended that the rate of taxation on Middlesex proper be 9.1-7 mills, producing \$26,862.92, for the purpose of paying the debenture interest and providing the sinking fund. Also that a rate of .35 of a mill be levied on the whole of Middlesex, producing \$32,410.57, to meet the current expenses.

It was also recommended by the finance committee that a sub-committee be appointed to pay over to the city \$15,000, when they secured proper certificates that the Victoria Hospital was furnished. Agreed.

On motion of Messrs. Hodgins and Elson the council decided to petition the minister of railways for assistance for the construction of the London and Lake Huron Railway, as "we believe the construction and operation of such a road would be of great advantage to this county."

Mr. E. W. Scattergood, of Lucan, asked the council to recommend to the Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario his appointment as police magistrate for the townships of London, Biddulph and Nissouri and the villages therein situated, without salary or allowances for travelling expenses. Referred to a special committee.

Mr. A. McGugan, of Caradoc, was recommended as county student of the O. A. C. for the term beginning October next.

Public school inspector's reports were

ordered to be printed in the minutes. Mr. J. C. Smith was granted a free peddler's license. The warden was instructed to have two boys now in jail handed over to the Children's Aid Society. Adjourned.

HUGE CONSOLIDATION

The Forepaugh-Sells Show the Greatest Combination of the Age.

Quite the biggest thing so far attempted in the circus line in this country is the consolidation of the Adam Forepaugh and Sells Brothers shows. Other "combined" shows have been announced before with a great flourish of trumpets, but such combinations have generally turned out to be chieftly on paper. But it seems this consolidation is just what is claimed for it; that it is a genuine consolidation of the two greatest shows in the country. They opened this season at the Madison Square Garden, in New York city, and the papers there all said that it was the biggest and best thing in the circus line ever seen in the metropolis. This statement is all the stronger when it is remembered that New York is peculiarly loyal to its idols, and for many years the Barnum & Bailey show had a monopoly of that city. It is in London now, and has become a fixed English corporation. Mr. Bailey is still the director and controller of the Adam Forepaugh show, and the consolidation was brought about by him to control absolutely the circus business in the cities of the country. To do this the consolidation has made a show of such commanding size and merit that no other concern can possibly hope to compete with it for patronage in the large cities. As the country has become so large that there are enough cities to occupy the time of one great show, the ordinary shows of inferior size and merit will be permitted to have the smaller cities and towns to themselves. So the consolidation cannot be considered as a trust, even if it is a monopoly in the same entertainment. The standing of this city in the estimation of the managers of the consolidation is shown by the fact that the big arena aggregation will exhibit here in all its vast entirety on Thursday, June 29.
