Nicholas pleaded with his cousin most earnestly and remained far into the night. He finally succeeded ir convincing the Czar of his view of the situation, and near midnight Baron Fredter again to the imperial villa. Witte arrived about 2 o'clock in the morning. and the so-called October manifesto, which will be one of the most important documents in all Russian history, was signed shortly after that hour. Witte and Nicholas returned to St. Petersburg together, reaching their homes between 5 and 6 o'clock in the morning. Nicholas told a friend that it was the longest night he ever spent, and declared that he emptied his cigarette case four times before Witte appeared.

Nicholas Nicholaievitch was in disgrace during the reign of Alexander III., originally because of the conduct of his father, who was a brother of Alexander II. The old gentleman was commanderin-chief of the army during the war with Turkey, and gained great credit and glory, which, however, he soon lost because of his profligate habits and dishonest transactions. Several millions or rubles passed through his hands which he was not able to account for. and Alexander III., who was very strict and scrupulous concerning the honor and behavior of the family, stripped his uncle of rank and authority, so far as he was able to do so, and banished him beyond the Caucasus, where he died in obscurity several years ago. A mile from Golden is a spur of the Rockies known as North Table Mountain. It rears a square head something like a quarter of a mile into the atmosphere, and is a pretty husky sort of a mountain, taken all in all.

For the last two weeks a portion of has taken to sliding, and the railroad people have found it necessary to keep a force of a hundred men busy shoveling the mountain dirt off the tracks. So far they have been able to keep ahead of the slide, but even with the aid of a steam shovel the task is a difficult one.

A quarter of the way up the mounconducted the waters of Clear Creek, over into the farmers' irrigated lands to the west. On one slope lower down is the Golden smelter. Below the ditch way, and bordering this are farms.

Engineers say that the cause is an unusual one. Far down in the ground is a stratum of hard, dry potters' clay, smooth as glass, and the great weight of the earth resting upon it is simply causing the mass to move slowly down toward the level.

It is scarcely an avalanche, as in the mountains this term is understood to represent a sudden slide of great masses of earth. The only difference is that this mountain is moving with almost imperceptible speed, about ten feet a
