Defender Gives Shamrock Worst Drubbing of the 1920 Regatta in Final Race. Winning Without Time Allowance—Best Boat Won, Declares Lipton At End of Race.

SANDY HOOK, N. J., July 27.—Defender Resolute gave the challenger, Shamrock IV, the worst drubbing of the 1920 regatta in the final race of the series today, winning boat-for-boat 13 minutes and 45 seconds-and the America's famous yachting cup for the last 38 years, and headed by remains in the United States.

Overcoming a 40-second lead and the advantage of a windward berth which Shamrock had taken at the start, the defender held a lead of 4 minutes and 8 seconds at the half-way stake of the 30-mile course and crossed the finish line 13 minutes and 5 seconds ahead. Including her handicap of 6 minutes and 40 seconds, Resolute won by 18 minutes and 45 seconds.

Sir Thomas Lipton, owner of the green challenger, voiced what appeared to be the unanimous verdict of yachtsmen who

had seen the five races when he declared tonight that "the best boat won."

As the challenger crossed the mark her British crew let out three ringing cheers for the victor, and the conquerors responded won."
