HAMILTON, Dec. 22.—"The farmer has had to accept the heaviest financial loss of any one class in the community during the last year," declared Hon. F. C. Biggs, minister of public works for Ontario, in addressing a roundtable conference of representative manufacturers; merchants, businessmen and labor representatives here tonight. "It may surprise you," continued My. Biggs, "to learn that the produce for which a farmer received \$1 a year ago, now brings him only 51 cents."

The farmer who still had to pay peak prices for everything he bought bearing an undue proportion of the present deflation, Mr. Biggs said. Citing his own case, Hon, Mr. Biggs said that last year he received 68 cents a pound for wool that he sold; this year the price was 18 cents. Last year he sold rough cowhides at 22 cents a pound, and this year 5% cents and 6 cents.

# OBJECT TO HYDRO SHOP

ST. THOMAS, Dec. 22.—The Hydro-Electric Shop as a competitor with the local merchants, doing business in similar lines, is not appreciated by the St. Thomas tradespeople. Complaint comes from the dealers that in the underselling of some articles at the Hydro Shop the merchants are actually paying the commissioners for the maintenance of this commercial undertaking through the prices exacted from them by the commission for light and power.

The merchants dealing in electrical supplies are few, they say, and cannot exert the same influence on the "powers" as perhaps businessmen in other lines. But they do insist that the hydro-electric commission should confine its activities to that for which the department was created. The addition of a stock of drygoods and boots and shoes, a shopman says, would just be as much within the province of the commissioners as dealing in other supplies. But a departure of the kind would raise a howl from the competing merchants that would shut every hydro shop carried on under the auspices of the commission.

### MANITOBA FARMERS **DECLINE SUGGESTION** OF NORRIS ALLIANCE

The Liberal Government Will Carry On Without Working Arrangement.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 22.—A committee of the Independent Farmers' Party in the Provincial Legislature finally met Premier T. C. Norris this morning with regard to their course of action in the coming session of the Manitoba Legislature. It had been anticipated that a working arrangement would be made or working arrangement would be made or a sort of fusion of the Government with the farmers' party, but the leader of the farmers, William Robson, presented to the premier the following resolution which was passed at a meeting this afternoon:

"The Independent Farmers' Party convened for the purpose of considering an invitation made them by Premier Norris to Join in a conference with his government to see if both parties could agree on a policy of joint action. The Independent Farmer group met and deliberated, deciding that while not opposing the Norris Government on general principles it was considered advisable, in order to preserve the identity of the Independent Farmer Party that they decline the suggestion of alliances. A further reason being their desire to retain their position of absolute independence.

Premier Norris, in a statement given out tonight, says the committee, speaking for themselves as individuals, assured the Government that they had no desire to encompass their defeat, but could take no other position than that outlined in the resolution. The premier added that he had suggested no merger but merely a working arrangement to carry on during the session. The main position, however, is left much as it was after the elections, and the Norris Government will carry on with some obstacles, anyway.

Mr. Lloyd George's suggestion that emigration is the only real remedy is seized upon by the Westminster Gazette, which asks: "Did ever a premier confess so frankly the bankruptcy of his statesmanship?"


