WESTON FAIR SHOWS A MOST GRATIFYING YEAR

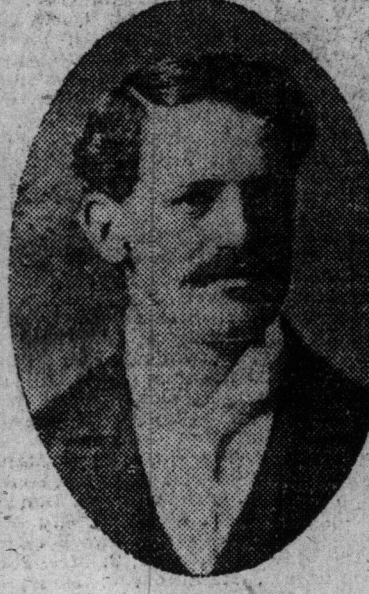
George W. Verrall is Again President—Markham S.S.A. Have Great Convention—Items.

TORONTO JUNCTION, Jan. 17.—There is a lot of scarlet fever in town at the present time. Upwards of ten houses are placarded and all of the cases are more or less serious. It is claimed that a lot of children are attending the schools in whose homes is scarlet fever. In these cases the attack is mild and physicians are not called in. It is understood that a most rigorous inspection of the schools is being made under the direction of the medical health officer, Dr. Hopkins. There are suggestions on the part of the more timid that the schools be closed for a time, but this extreme step has not been considered by the authorities. Thus far one death has occurred from the disease.

OTTAWA, Jan. 17.—Supreme Chief Ranger E. G. Stevenson of the I.O.F. Supreme Physician C. D. Clarke, Supreme Secretary Matheson, Supreme Counsellor W. H. Hunter, Actuary S. H. Pipe and other chief officers of the I.O.F. interviewed Hon. 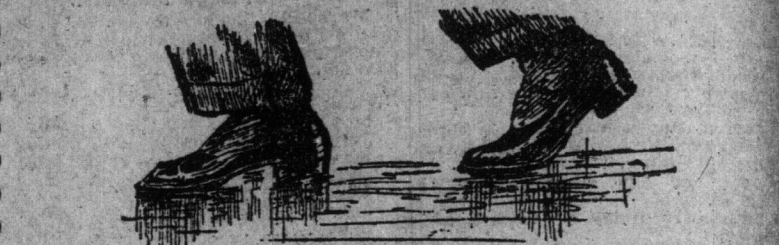

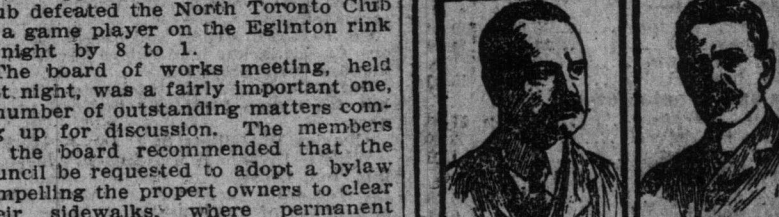
