

THE CONTEST IN QUEBEC HAS GROWN VERY BITTER

Gouin and Bourassa Audiences Are Fortunately Kept From Clashing - Charges of Bribery.

MONTREAL, June 7.—(Special.)—Hon. Lomer Gouin addressed a large meeting last evening at St. James' Marketplace, while his opponent, Mr. Henri Bourassa, held forth to a gathering even more numerous on the Champ de Mars.

It was fortunate, in fact, that the two crowds did not get together, for there would surely have been bloodshed in abundance. It is not likely that any votes were changed by these gatherings, as any change made at this late hour will be by hard, cold-cash, and it is not by any means certain that even this method can now do much harm.

The Nationalists claim to-day that a great number of people who are known to be supporters of the opposition have received envelopes containing \$5, and that the scheme to elect Gouin was an attempt to buy votes. Le Nationaliste advises that such tactics cannot do any harm, and voters are asked to keep the money and vote Bourassa every time.

Then Mr. Gouin's friends issued another circular denouncing Bourassa as an enemy of the party, and it also was issued from a speech delivered at Laval some years ago by Archbishop Bruchési, who was then minister of the province of Quebec.

The Archbishop, who is now in the country, was however, communicating with, and his chancellor, Canon Roy, is out to-day saying that Mr. Bruchési declared in his words, as quoted in the circular, were of no importance, and that the character given to the incident by the circular was entirely misleading.

Then G. Langlois was also the victim to-day of an anonymous circular distributed at the church doors, telling the faithful that the Nationalist danger man and should not be sent to Quebec with his Masonic and free-thought theories. His friends, however, go to the doors of all the big Roman Catholic churches and bought up the circulars in question.

While claiming everything in sight, and with Bourassa's defeat by a thousand, it became known that at the hour of polling draws near that there is more than a little unrest in the government camp, and the great sums of money will have to be thrown into St. James, Nicolet, and Montserrat.
