Question : "I read with interest your article on poultry farming in The World of the 8th inst. I have \$1000 and am thinking of starting a poultry farm. I always kept fowl when I resided in the old country.
"Is this enough capital? Kindly

"Is this enough capital? Kindly give me names of poultry books for beginners. I may say I can always sell my fowl (glive) to a big shipper. A heard it remarked that in this country a net profit of 10c per fowl is about the average. Is this a fair estimate? What would be initial expenses roughly, and how many fowl could be kept on 5 to 10 acres."

Answer: You are asking a big question. The word of the capital some good books are: Bulletins No. 151 and 163, published by Ontario Department of Agriculture; Poultry Craft, by Robinson, \$2.00; Farm Poultry, by Watson, \$1.35, and the American Standard of Perfection, \$1.60.
