TURKISH MURDERER CHOSEN TO DISTRIBUTE CHARITY. LONDON, May 27.—The Times Constantinople correspondent says that much apprehension has been caused among the Young Turks and Armenians by the news that the new Valet of Adana, who is described as a somewhat fanatical Kurd, has entrusted the important task of the distribution of the government relief fund to Hagdad, a Turkish land owner, who was the first to lead a band of armed men into the bazaar at Adana and begin the slaughter of Armenians.
